George Lott Out At Forest Hills

NEW YORK, Sept. 9 (AP)—Favorites today were wondering who was going to be next to be defeated in the national tennis singles tournament.

Perhaps even more surprising than the downfall of Jean Borotra before the onslaught of Berkeley Bell on Saturday was the exit of George Lott in the second round yesterday.

Lott met his Waterloo in his first match of the tournament after drawing a first round bye and his Wellington was that seasoned campaigner, Richard N. Williams II.

Williams, winner of the title in 1914 and 1916 and now 39 years of age, had enough of his old cunning and sharp-shooting ability left to take advantage of one of Lott's temperamental lapses and win 7-9, 7-5, 6-1.

Bill Tilden, whose campaign for his eighth national title grows smoother and smoother with the elimination of his foremost adversaries, seemed fairly proof against a surprise defeat today as he was drawn against Ed Peabodyman of New York.

National League 'Big Four' Meet In Games Today

The four leading contenders for the national league pennant were in New York today, the pace setting Chicago Cubs meeting the Brooklyn Robins at Ebbets field and the rising St. Louis Cardinals tangle with the New York Giants.

The Robins threw the pennant scramble into even more of a turmoil yesterday, when they won the only game played in either of the major leagues, defeating the Phillies 10 to 2 and 11 to 4 in a double bill. The twin victory sent the men from Flatbush bounding into third place, a half game in front of the idle Giants and a full game back of the Cubs.

The second battle was a close contest until the seventh, when the Robins again let loose with their big guns, scoring six runs and driving Willoughby from the mound. Meanwhile Jumbo Elliott was breezing along but he too weakened in the same frame and Hollis Thurston was sent to the rescue after the Phillies had counted twice.

LOVELL ISSUES FOOTBALL MAIL TO ALL ALUMS

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 9.—More than 10,000 Oregon state college alumni members and ex-students will receive next week ticket application blanks for the Oregon state football games this season.

In his letter of information to alumni, Carl A. Lovell, general manager here, points out the importance of having all applications for the Shrine hospital benefit game with Washington State college at Portland November 1 in the stadium ticket office at Portland not later than October 11. Applications for the homecoming game with University of Oregon at Corvallis not later than October 23.

More interest than ever in football is evidenced by the number of inquiries being received at the college daily. Lovell advises those wishing choice seats to send in their applications as soon as possible as he expects a sellout for both games.

The Washington State game is being played for the benefit of the Shrine hospital for crippled children in Portland. Committees of both Shriners and non-Shriners have been busy all summer making preparations for this game. More than 30,000 exchange tickets have been mailed to Shriners throughout the state. The largest crowd ever to see a football game in the state of Oregon is expected.

The University of Oregon game, as has been the case for several years, will be a sellout. Tickets for this game will go in the fashion of the proverbial hot cakes.

Sections are being reserved for Oregon State fans for the games with southern California at Los Angeles, October 4; Stanford at Palo Alto, October 18; U. C. L. A. at Los Angeles, November 21; and West Virginia at Chicago November 27.
