Shinplasters, or fractional currency, were issued during and after the Civil war because of the disappearance of coins from circulation and the shortage of small coins. The first issue of fractional money was made on August 1, 1862. The last and fifth issue was made from February 28, 1874 to February 15, 1875.

Savory Meat Loaf (Serving Eight)
1 pound chopped round of beef.
1/2 pound chopped round of veal.
1 cup bread crumbs.
2 eggs.
2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper.
1 tablespoon finely chopped onions.
1 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1 cup tomatoes.
4 slices bacon.
Mix the meat, crumbs, eggs, seasonings, salt, paprika and tomatoes.

Pour into a greased loaf pan. Arrange the bacon slices on the top. Bake 1 hour in moderate oven. Unmold carefully and serve hot or cold.
Peach Pudding
3 cups sliced peaches.
1/2 cup sugar.
2 tablespoons flour.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg.
2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1 cup water.
2 tablespoons butter.
Mix the peaches, sugar, flour and spices. Pour into a shallow, greased baking pan. Add rest of ingredients and cover with the dough.
Dough
2 cups flour.
2 teaspoons baking powder.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
4 tablespoons lard.
2-3 cup milk.
Mix the flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in the lard with a knife. Slowly add the milk until a soft dough forms. Pat it out on a floured board. Fit on top the peach mixture. Make 4 holes in the top of the dough. Bake 15 minutes in moderate oven. Add the syrup mixture and bake 20 minutes.
Syrup Mixture
2-3 cup light brown sugar.
1 tablespoon butter.
1 cup sugar.
Mix ingredients and boil 2 minutes.
To remove blueberry stains from linens, pour boiling water through the stains and wash in warm water and let dry.
