WALLOWA, Ore. (Special) — There is said to be a considerable shortage of stock water at many of the farms in the hill sections. With no rains to speak of during the past two months the ground has become very dry and some of the best wells are springs have become quite low. Water is being hauled several miles in places.

Some of the large sheepmen of this section expect to bring their lambs out of the mountains within the next few weeks for shipment to market. Prices are said to be quite low and with running expenses practically as heavy as at any time during the past number of years many of the flock owners fear they will lose money on the lambs produced this season.

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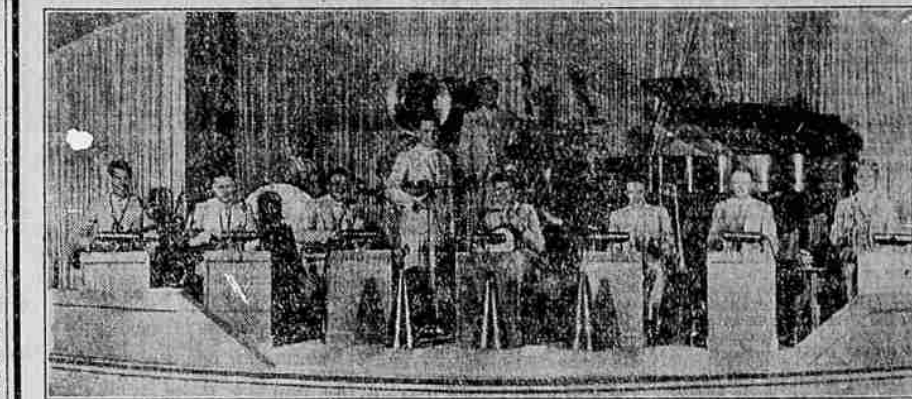
