Merger Forms Largest Airway, Links America

MIAMI, Fla., (AP) — The world's largest air transport line will link South America and the United States when Pan-American Airways and the New York, Rio and Buenos Aires lines merge September 15.

Less than three years after Charles A. Lindbergh in his Spirit of St. Louis blazed a trail of good will among our neighbors to the south, American air lines completely loop South America. Buenos Aires is still three climates, but only seven days, away from New York.

With a fleet of upwards of 100 multi-engine planes flying more than 100,000 miles weekly, Pan-America goes ahead of the government-subsidized Deutsche Lufthansa of Germany.

Merger of the two companies brings under one directorate 23,217 miles of aerial highway for international mail and passenger service. Of this, but 100 miles is over the United States, from Miami to Low-er-Florida Key, Florida.

Officials of Pan-American plan to extend their passenger service soon.

Modificationist Nominated For Congress Seat

SEATTLE, Sept. 10 (AP) — On the basis of very complete unofficial reports from yesterday's primary election, Ralph A. Horr, of Seattle, a modificationist of dry law, was nominated for congress in the first Washington district over John F. Miller, incumbent, also of Seattle.

In the 451 precincts reported out of the 460 in the district, Horr polled 32,045 votes to 28,495 cast for Miller.

Horr first raised the banner of revolt against existing prohibition laws when as chairman of the King county republican central committee, he carried the fight for modification to a successful conclusion in the county convention. Later he led another successful anti-dry fight in the state convention and obtained adoption of a wet plank in the state platform.

He then carried the fight into the primaries. Miller, on the other hand, adhered to his former dry support, expressing the wet sentiment, disparaging his county and state conventions.

Charles G. Helfner, Seattle, unopposed democratic entry in the primaries is an outspoken proponent of federal dry law repeal and an advocate of return of control of the liquor traffic to the states.

In the second congressional district, Lindsey H. Hadley of Bellingham, veteran congressman, was given a close race by Payton Peterson, Snohomish, former state legislator. With 338 precincts reported, Hadley had 11,355 votes to 10,431 cast for Peterson. Frank E. Hammond, Seattle, a wet was a poor third with 563 votes.

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Egg Prices Go Higher; Butter Market Steady

PORTLAND, Sept. 10 (AP) — Wholesale egg prices were advanced by Pacific cooperative poultry producers this morning, 2 cents per extra to 32 and 1 cent on standards and mediums to 30 and 26 cents respectively.

Majority of dealers were quoting the same prices and irregularity in prices which have caused local trade confusion in weeks past was believed to be ended. The market showed a steady tone with moderate volume of receipts and fair demand.

Butter market ruled steady with demand lagging in some quarters and some price shading reported.

In the fruit and vegetable trade tomatoes were showing better price strength at 40 to 65 cents for No. 1 grade. Quality continued excellent in spite of recent rains.

First Concord grapes arrived on regular carlot basis and were offered at 5 cents a pound.

Good green beans were scarce and advanced to 8 to 7 cents a pound.

Operating prices on new crop almonds have been set according to variety as follows: Imperial, 17 1/2 cents; Nipal, 16 1/2; Pearless, 15; and Drakes, 14c.

Canadian Crop Of Grain Estimated

WINNIPEG, Sept. 10 (AP) — Western Canada's wheat crop for 1930 is estimated at 35,812,000 bushels by the Manitoba Free Press.

The estimate is considerably larger than the turn of the 1929 crop but only a little more than 60 per cent of the record crop of 1928. Total western wheat acreage is placed at 32,960,000.

It is estimated the three prairie provinces will harvest 267,242,000 bushels of oats from 88,286,000 acres; 115,080,000 bushels of barley from 4,400,000 acres; 25,650,000 bushels of rye from 1,370,000 acres and 4,305,000 bushels of flax from 571,000 acres.
