Four of Present Justices Passed On Eighteenth Amendment Before

By Sam Hildebrand WASHINGTON (Special)—Whispering aloofly in a semi-circle, the four justices of the supreme court passed on the eighteenth amendment before the audience rises.

A voice begins: "Oyez, oyez, the honorable, the chief justice and—" The supreme court is in session, and before this body is to come the decision of Judge William Clark of New Jersey holding the eighteenth amendment unconstitutional.

Charles Evans Hughes, chief justice, sits in the center of the bar overlooking the spectators. He is a big man and his fan-shaped beard is white. It is a bold lawyer who does not regard him with awe. He looks like a chief justice.

If his honors were medals—and he would weigh him down—they would weigh him down. He is a New Yorker; was governor of the state for two terms; has been associate justice of the court over which he presides; was the Republican presidential candidate in 1916; Coolidge's secretary of state; judge of the permanent court of international justice and named chief justice in 1930 to succeed William Howard Taft.

At the right of the chief justice sits Oliver Wendell Holmes. Ninety years have stooped his body but his head with its abundant snowy hair is magnificent, his mind quick and keen.

His father was Oliver Wendell Holmes of Boston, wit, author, actor, lecturer and physician. The son is wit, author, aristocrat and jurist.

They call him "the great liberal" and his dissenting opinions have become legal classics. He was a member of the bench in 1920 when the court by a unanimous decision held the eighteenth amendment constitutional.

Willis Van Devanter sits to the left of the chief justice. Born in Indiana and educated at Yale, he went to Wyoming when the state was a territory. He was an assistant attorney general and was named to the supreme bench in 1910 by Taft. Lawyers who have argued before him have squirmed under his penetrating questions.

He is the court specialist in Indiana laws and treaties. He delivered the 1920 decision holding the eighteenth amendment constitutional.

James Clark McReynolds, a Tennesseean and a bachelor, sits by Holmes. He was attorney general from 1918 to August, 1914, when he was appointed associate justice. He is blunt and direct, as many a lawyer attempting oratorical heights has learned. McReynolds also participated in the 1920 decision.

Louis Dembitz Brandeis is a Kentuckian born in Louisville and educated abroad and at Harvard. He was named an associate justice in 1916 by Woodrow Wilson and confirmed after a sharp fight.

Some senators viewed his liberal attitude with distrust. He did not change and goes along with Holmes many times on questions involving broad matters of public policy. Brandeis has authority of law affecting the interstate commerce commission and railroads.

George Sutherland sits to the right of McReynolds. He was born in Buckinghamsire, England, educated at the University of Michigan, went to Utah and was a United States senator. He was appointed by Harding in 1922.

Pierce Butler, of Brandeis' left, did not emigrate. He was born in Minnesota and in 1923 when Harding appointed him to the bench he was practicing law in St. Paul. He sides more frequently with Sutherland, McReynolds and Van Devanter than with Holmes and Brandeis.

Harlan F. Stone, at the extreme right, is a New Yorker. A member of President Hoover's "medicine ball cabinet," he was expected by many to become chief justice when Taft resigned.

Some senate progressives thought him too conservative when he was named by Coolidge in 1925, but paradoxically his views coincide many times with those of Holmes and Brandeis.

Owen J. Roberts of Philadelphia is the youngest member of the bench. He made his reputation as a prosecutor in the oil lease cases. He was named just after the senate had rejected Judge John J. Parker of North Carolina in 1930, and pleased men as far apart in political tenets as Norris of Nebraska and Reed of Pennsylvania.

These are the jurists who will pass upon the Clark decision.

Dakotans Move To Unite Voters On Farm Issues

By Frank I. Weiler (Associated Press Farm Editor) WASHINGTON (Special)—Bumblings of discontent with certain phases of the nation's farm relief program have become more distinct.

In the wake of farm bill political realignments in the November elections, 300 North Dakota Republicans leaders have launched a campaign to pull the party's warring factions together on a militant agricultural program.

"They plan to unite as 'progressive' Republicans the old Independent voters' association and the non-partisan league, formed in 1916 as a result of dissatisfaction with both the independent and regular wings of the party."

The plan reflects, says Lynn J. Frazier, non-partisan league senator from North Dakota, a growing sentiment in the wheat belt against the present method of handling the wheat surplus.

Farmers, he says, believe the farm board should rescind its intention of selling stabilization corporation holdings when the price reaches that at which they were acquired, and declare against liquidation until the entire wheat surplus has been removed.

Farmers fear, he continues, that the grain trade will not buy wheat in sufficient quantity to enhance the price so long as it knows stabilization grain will come on the market as soon as values advance and perhaps jeopardize their positions.

The platform of the "progressives" is national in character and, it is suggested, may influence farm thought in neighboring states.

It approves the farm board but recommends the application of McNary-Haugen principles in surplus control — namely to get the surplus off the market either by getting it out of the country or indefinitely into storage.

It proposes that the \$77,000,000 profits of the government's war time wheat stabilization corporation be used to provide long-time storage facilities under direction of the farm board, and it attacks the Smoot-Hawley tariff act as unfair to agriculture.
