PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 14 (Special)—With Tina Schupp, Claudia Murio, John Charles Thomas, Berna Lester, Maria Oleson, Alexander Egan, Theodore Strick and a host of other opera singers of international renown, the Civic Opera company will visit Portland March 12, 13 and 14 for a gala season of four operas at the Portland Public auditorium.

A large committee of Portland citizens has undertaken the organization which is to cost \$25,000 and plans are being made for the season as the outstanding social and musical event of the year. The company will make only four appearances on the Pacific Coast, the tour including only Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and Portland.

The entire Chicago organization including the cast, chorus, ballet and orchestra—314 persons in all—will travel across the continent in three special trains with one special train of 17 baggage cars carrying the scenery, equipment and lighting effects. In the Rockies, the company will present four operas in Seattle and four in Portland.

**MORE MONEY
TO ENFORCE
PROHIBITION**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (Special)—Large increases for enforcement of prohibition and immigration laws were included in the 235,700,000 supply bill for the state, justice, labor and commerce departments reported Tuesday to the house.

An increase of \$2,350,000 allowed by the house appropriations committee for 500 additional agents in the prohibition bureau resulted in the filing of a minority report by Representative Frank, Republican, Massachusetts.

In all the prohibition bureau was allowed \$11,945,000 for the next fiscal year.

The labor department figure was \$18,830,000, with an increase of more than one million for deportation of aliens and other immigration bureau uses.

The total for the four departments was \$24,110,000 below budget estimates, but \$2,350,000 above total expenditures for the present fiscal year.

**Attorney Declares
Brothers Innocent**

CHICAGO, Jan. 14 (Special)—Robert E. Cantwell, a member of the legal staff defending Leo V. Brothers, asserted Tuesday that he was a witness of the killing of Alfred Jake Langie last June 9 and Brothers was not the assassin.

Called into conference with the St. Louis gunman's attorney, Cantwell said from his own viewpoint he was convinced of Brothers' innocence. He himself had seen the Tribune reporter shot down in the Michigan boulevard pedestrian tunnel. He said he had never been called by the prosecution.

The slayer, Cantwell declared, had a cauliflower right ear.

Brothers was indicted for the murder yesterday and afterwards was transferred from a secret hiding place to the county jail, where for the first time since his capture December 21 he was allowed to see his mother and attorney.

CAROL HEROLD DIES

MUENSTER, Westphalia, Germany (Special)—Carol Herold, "father of the German Reichstag," died here at the age of 82. He had been for 42 years a member of the Reichstag, and for 23 a member of the Reichstag, and was honorary president of the central party.

Her Herold remained hale and hearty almost to the end of his life. Two years ago he soundly thrashed a burglar he found in his home.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (Special)—The house has adopted a proposal to require the army to purchase for use in the United States only those articles made from domestically produced raw materials.

The innovation was written into the war department supply bill for the next fiscal year by a vote of 62 to 20 on the motion of Representative Cacer, Republican, New York.

Nathan Straus Laid To Rest In Plain Pine Box

NEW YORK, Jan. 14 (Special)—The body of Nathan Straus, philanthropist, was carried to a grave yesterday in a plain box of white pine boards.

Instead of a huge hearse he left behind him the love of the needy and suffering on whom he lavished much of the wealth he earned as a merchant.

Eight Jewish policemen bore the pine coffin through streets which lined Temple Street and crowded with weeping onlookers. Benay Leonard, former light-weight boxing champion, walked beside John D. Rockefeller Jr. among the honorary pallbearers.

There was no eulogy in the simple funeral service. Prayers were read and Prof. William Leon Phelps of Yale read a factual biographical sketch of his friend.

He told of the rise of the young immigrant boy to the rank of merchant prince and said the financier's "idea of a 'quick turnover' was where the money came swiftly into his hands and was swiftly turned over into the hands of the poor."

Professor Phelps described Mr. Straus' great benefactions to the men who crowded New York's breadlines in 1892.

WORDY BATTLE MARKS HEARING IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (Special)—Verbal conflict between Indian business officials and senators marked renewal of hearings before the senate Indian committee on sale of timber of the Klamath reservation in Southwest Oregon.

"It is apparent to any layman going out to the Klamath reservation that statements made here about sustained yield being practiced there are bunk," declared Senator Frank, Republican, Oregon.

Indian bureau representatives registered strong objection.

Senator Franker, Republican, North Dakota, said the report of Lee Mink, Republican, Oregon, that the Klamath territory, predicted the timber resources of the region would be wiped out in a few years if present methods continued.

On behalf of the 1045 Indians on the reservation, Mr. and Mrs. D. Wade Crawford, delegates, objected to selling our timber on long term contracts which the market is down.

Asserting eighteen companies are now operating in the Klamath timber stand, Crawford contended "if something is not done in the near future, the lumberman and the wool growers are going to ruin that reservation."

DIME BANKS TO BE FAVORED AT THIRTY DAY DINNERS

WASHINGTON (Special)—Dime banks, utility boxes and budget books will be given as favors at thirty dinners to be served all over the country January 17.

The day will mark the beginning of national thrift week to be observed by 60,000 members of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women. Bankers, insurance men and building and loan representatives will stress the importance of saving in after-dinner talks.

A questionnaire is being sent business women to ascertain their savings habits, whether through banks, insurance or property.
