W. O. W. HEADS FACE THREAT OF NEW SUIT

DENVER (AP)—Threat of another suit to block the working operation of the new insurance rates of the Woodmen of the World, with headquarters at Denver, was made here at a meeting of delegates called to render rates exacted at the Oakland, Cal., meeting of the organization two years ago.

The Colorado supreme court recently ruled that the insurance rates were not constitutionally adopted because the Oakland meeting failed to specify the exact vote.

John J. Moran of Boise, Idaho, leader of the faction opposing the change, said if the present convention ratifies the legislation of the Oakland meeting in 1928, another suit probably will be filed to block its operation.

Informal approval of the entire Oakland legislation had been given and a final vote was to be taken later on.

Congressman W. C. Hawley of Oregon, chairman of the Denver Woodmen board of head managers, acted as chairman of the convention.

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Legge Innocent Of Charges Is Board Verdict

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Chairman Legge of the farm board was exonerated by an investigating committee of the national farmers union yesterday of charges that he told the senate agricultural committee the farm board had acted to depress the price of wheat and cotton.

Cal. A. Wood of Kansas, chairman of a subcommittee sent here to investigate Legge's testimony, expressed confidence in the method employed by the board in handling wheat.

The investigation was made as the result of charges by John A. Simpson, president of the national farmers' union.

Wood said he believed Senator Thomas of Oklahoma, Simpson and Legge had all been perfectly frank in the controversy. It was a statement by Senator Thomas about Legge's testimony that precipitated the dispute.

Other members of the committee were M. W. Thatcher, manager of the Farmers' Union (national association), St. Paul, Minn.; J. R. Callahan of Wisconsin and Thomas Howard of Colorado.

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
