A COMPANY LUNCHEON
Cream of Asparagus Soup
Salted Walnuts
Ham and Apple Loaf
Mashed Sweet Potatoes
Buttered Peas
Hot Rolls
Pear Salad
Date Cake Topped with Whipped Cream
Coffee

—Ham and Veal Loaf, Serving 8
2 cups chopped cooked ham.
1 cup chopped cooked veal.
3 tablespoons chopped celery.
1 tablespoon finely chopped onion.
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
2 eggs.
1 cup soft bread crumbs.
1 cup milk.
2 tablespoons butter, melted.
Mix all ingredients and pour into buttered loaf pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold carefully and cut in thin slices. Arrange on serving platter and garnish with slices of hard cooked eggs and parsley.

Mashed Sweet Potatoes
3 cups mashed sweet potatoes.
1 egg yolk.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
1 egg white, beaten.
2 tablespoons butter.
Mix the potatoes, yolk, salt, paprika and butter. Beat 2 minutes. Drop portions on buttered baking pan. Spread with egg white and bake 15 minutes in moderate oven or until molds are browned well. Carefully remove to serving platter and garnish with small pieces of candied pineapple.

Pear Salad
8 halves canned pears.
1/2 cup chopped celery.
1-3 cup chopped candied ginger.
2-3 cup mayonnaise.

Date Cake
1/2 cup fat.
1/2 cups light brown sugar.
2 eggs.
1 cup sour or buttermilk.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 cup chopped dates.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
2 1/2 cups flour.
1 teaspoon soda.

Cream the fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and beat 2 minutes. Pour into shallow, greased pan and bake 25 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cut in squares and serve.
