# Americans Are Growing Healthier

(The citizen's committee of Buffalo, N. Y., is authority for the following information.)

So says the United States Census—and a study of their tables reveals that the most marked improvement appears—first in 1918, when the war-time restrictive liquor laws became effective—and again in 1920, which was the first year under prohibition.

Only one-half as many people died from tuberculosis last year as died in the best year before prohibition, the death rate being cut 50 per cent in ten years. This alone is a saving of sixty-seven thousand lives each year.

**BELIEVE IT OR NOT**  
Deaths from meningitis, that terror of parents' heart, which had been unyielding to medical science, are less by an average of 66 per cent since 1920.

Deaths from Bright's disease are less by 20 per cent.  
Deaths from pneumonia are less by 33 per cent.  
Deaths from typhoid are less by 46 per cent.  
Deaths from bronchitis are less by 60 per cent.

## THE BUFFALO CITIZENS' COMMITTEE

Representative Emmett Howard of Lane, long one of the most active members of the legislature on matters of roads and highways, announces that he will sponsor a resolution in the legislature for a highway bridge across the Rogue river at Gold Beach a memorial to the late Governor Patterson.

It has been the custom in the past to make important highway bridges in honor of members of the highway commission or others prominent in state affairs.

The first of the administration program bills are scheduled to be introduced in the legislature early next week when measures providing for the abolition of the public service commission, the establishment of a one man commission in its stead and the grange power district bill are to be presented. The latter, being drafted by grange officials, provides machinery for the operation of a grange act passed at the November election, and was endorsed by Governor Julius L. Meier.

Members close to the administration announced last night that the bills were ready for the legislative hopper. The business of the session to date has been held back, legislators stated, by waiting for the move on the part of Meier for his program in the form of measures, on one hand, and for the filling of the vacancies in the legislature on the other.

## Chinese Reds Fire On River Steamers

HANKOW, Jan. 15 (AP)—Red batteries on the banks of the Yangtze river below Kienn, Hupeh province, today resumed their heavy cannon fire upon passing steamers.

A veritable report from Kaifeng, Honan province, also said 2000 bandits late last month attacked and plundered numerous villages in western Honan, kidnaping 300 women and children and driving off herds of cattle.

## STATE LAST TIMES TODAY

**Public Hearing**—The first senate bill introduced, proposing the closing of the Rogue river to commercial fishing, was announced last night Wednesday night at the state capitol by the joint senate and senate committee. The committee was also given the first of a series of changes in the state game code introduced by Senator E. W. Miller of Jackson county and Representative H. S. Deuel of Jackson county. Other measures on the game and fish code will be introduced as the session progresses, the committee was informed.

**Uniform pheasant and deer hunting seasons throughout the state are among the provisions in the game law revision bill. The restrictions to pheasants, however, does not apply to counties that are completely closed to pheasant hunting.**

The bill would permit Chinese pheasant hunting from October 15 to 31 inclusive, and deer hunting from September 20 to October 20. Bag limit is made two blacktail, or one mule deer or one whitetail deer during the season. The definition of game fish is extended to include all species of salmon taken on hook and line. The section dealing with the creation of game districts is repealed.

**Conform With U. S. Law.**  
Quail and bobwhite quail are made game birds. The bag limit for ducks and geese is made to conform to the federal law. The closed season for prairie chickens is extended to the year 1935, and the season for hunting partridges in open counties is made the same as for pheasants.

The closed season on crappin, catfish, perch and sunfish is fixed between April 15 and July 1 of each year. The bill makes it unlawful to lie in wait while dogs are running deer. Slings are prohibited on firearms. Seizure and sale of automobiles used in transporting illegal fish is provided for, and the game commission is authorized to impose a tax of not over 25 cents each for all game fish brought into the state for sale.

The present law is amended a license for persons hunting on one acre land for deer, and for deer hunters under 14 years old. A year-round closed season on beaver is established. The game breeder's license fee is raised from \$2 to \$5.

The salmon bag limit is made uniform, allowing three in one day and 10 in seven consecutive days. The section allowing the governor to suspend the hunting season is repealed. **Penalty For Carelessness.**  
Injury to persons with firearms while hunting is made punishable as mayhem, and killing as manslaughter.

The bill would prohibit fishing from boats or other floating devices in Deschutes river below Bend, and in McKenzie river above its confluence with Blue river as far as Belknap bridge for four years, while the stream would be permanently closed to boat fishing above Belknap bridge.

## POSTMASTER SHOOTS SELF

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 15 (AP)—Victor O. Greenslade, postmaster at Huntington, Baker county, shot himself in the head three times yesterday and was in a critical condition in a Weiser hospital. He is 66 years old and has been postmaster 17 years. Physicians said there was little hope of his recovery.

A federal postal inspector examined the Huntington office but said if any discrepancy existed in the accounts it was small.

Greenslade has a wife, a minor son and a daughter. He is highly regarded at Huntington.

## SACRED PICTURES

Icons are sacred pictures, generally painted on wood and covered, except the faces and hands, with relief of gold, silver or seed pearls. They are used in the eastern churches and are placed on what is known as the "iconostasis screen." The word "icon" is derived from Greek, "eikon," meaning image.—Pathfinder Magazine.

# OREGON FIVE TO BE HOST TO COUGARS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 15 (Special)—The Oregon basketball team, under the direction of William J. Reinhart, veteran coach, will spend the home season this weekend. Washington State's long shot experts will furnish the opposition for the Webfoots in a two-game series here Friday and Saturday nights.

With seven veterans back from last year, Reinhart has developed a fast combination. The Webfoots are handicapped by the small size of the players but their great speed is expected to offset this.

Oregon will start five lettermen against the Cougars with Vincent Delp and Winsor Calkins at forward; Jean Eberhart at center; and Henry Lovoff and Kermit Stevens at guards. Cliff Horner, guard, and Bill Keenan, diminutive forward, are the other two lettermen on hand this year.

Several newcomers have added to the strength of the Webfoots. Cap Roberts, center; Red Rogers, forward; Will Waldron, Boyle, guard, are the most promising.

The Webfoots went through their pre-season training schedule without defeat. They won three games from Multnomah Club, five from Portland and trimmed the strong Gonzaga quiet. Washington won two games of the opening conference play but Reinhart is confident his team will finish well up in the conference standings.
