## Wheeler Attacks Statement Made By the President

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana, denounced in the senate today President Hoover's statement criticizing the recall of three postal commissioners. The Montana said it was a "strange statement for a president to issue—impugning the good intentions of the senate" and it seemed Mr. Hoover had been "unbowed" with the idea expressed in editorials in the Washington Post, and by Edward McClean, its publisher, wherein it is said: "Here is the successor to Washington, Lincoln and Cleveland." "I'm afraid the president has not only read with interest these editorial attacks," said Wheeler, "but has been reading what some of his satellites have been saying about him; namely, Mr. (Robert H.) Lucas of the Republican national committee."
