TUNNEL BILL INTRODUCED IN LEGISLATURE

SALEM, Jan. 15 (AP)—The expected tunnel bill, authorizing the state highway commission to construct tunnels connecting with or forming a part of the state highway system, was introduced in the senate yesterday by Senators Woodward and Fisher.

It authorizes the state to purchase and condemn property for the purpose, and authorizes the issuance of tunnel revenue bonds of the state, payable solely from tunnel tolls and earnings. It provides for the collection of tolls for the use of tunnels. Tunnels may, under the terms of the bill, be built either with or without the limits of corporate towns.

The bill authorizes the highway commission to issue tunnel revenue bonds, principal and interest payable solely from the special fund provided by the act. Interest on the bonds would be limited to 6 per cent. The bonds would mature in not over 20 years and would be redeemable at the option of the state at not more than par and a premium of 5 per cent. The bonds would be signed by the governor, the secretary of state and the secretary of the highway commission. The bonds would be exempt from taxation and would be sold at a price whereby the purchaser would receive interest of not less than 6 per cent.

The highway commission is required to maintain, repair, operate and control the tunnels, fix toll rates and establish rules for their operation. All salaries and compensation would be paid from funds provided in the act.

Here's a Racket That Pays The Inventors Well

BELVIDERE, Ill., Jan. 16 (AP)—Albert W. Benham is a financial prophet honored in his own home town, paying interest rates of 20 to 50 per cent in the life savings of neighbors who have put up with an obscure shipping clerk during most of his 45 years.

Every Monday they gather in Benham's office, located in a small garage on the main street of this community of 8,000, to give him their wages and savings, receive his short-time judgment notes as security, or collect their interest at double or triple the usual rates.

Benham's business, which he describes as "bargains," began two years ago among fellow workers in a factory here and have extended to Rockford, Elgin, Joliet, Kankakee, Chicago and other nearby cities. The first complaint, he said, was not from one of his customers but from local bankers who knew of an obscure shipping clerk with a high financial background and his high financing had caused withdrawals on \$310,000 from Deuvere banks.

Omar H. Wright, president of the Second National bank here, former president of the Illinois Bankers' association and director of state finances, asked an investigation of Benham's affairs.

"Ten being investigated," Benham a bald, robust man with a healthy manner, said, "but I don't mind. Other investigators became customers. More money comes in. There's no law against borrowing money. Six per cent."

Senator Heflin Claims "Defeat" Due to Thievery

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (AP)—A charge by Senator Heflin, Democrat, Alabama, that he was defeated for re-election last November by "thievery" from his colleague, Senator Black, Thursday that the election was "as fair as any election ever held in any state in the United States."

Heflin said he actually won the Alabama senatorial election by 100,000 votes.

"The ballot box thievery of Tammany and Pittsburgh have nothing on my state," Heflin said.

Black said he and the Democrats of Alabama would welcome an investigation of the election and expressed his confidence it would show the election was "fair."

Black said he did not want to enter into a controversy with his colleague but he could not sit silently by and hear the charge an election in his state had been "stolen" without making a reply.

Richie Attacks Prohibition In Inaugural Talk

ANNAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 15 (AP)—Taking the oath as Governor of Maryland for the fourth consecutive time, Albert C. Ritchie, the first ever to be re-elected to that office, Wednesday made an attack on national prohibition and federal centralization and called for a return to the virtues of a larger measure of self-help and localized government.

He declared that business must recognize the problem of unemployment "is its own and not the state's" and that "government itself has helped create the present crisis."

"I believe the country is entering a decade which will see a new economic and political depression in which the ideals and principals incarnate in our Maryland traditions and institutions will find fulfillment," said Governor Ritchie.

"These traditions are tolerant in all things and to all people, ordered liberty for the individual and the right to follow his own pursuits as to secure his own happiness in his own way, so long as he does not interfere with like rights of others or the recognized sanctions of society; and a self-governed state, free to settle its own problems in conformity with the needs of its people, who should be unhampered by an excess of government from within and by undue federal supervision or interference from without."

Health Talks

KEEPING THE NOSE CLEAR
When the nose is clogged with secretions due to a cold, breathing is interfered with and the passages of the upper respiratory tract, instead of serving to protect, become the seat of intense bacterial activity.

Hence during a cold it is desirable to keep the nasal passages as clear as possible. This may be done by means of mild aseptic saline solutions, sprayed into the nostrils a little at a time, or snuffed back through the nose and expectorated.

It is common belief that clearing the nose by snuffing back an "hawking" the mucus from the nose and throat is dangerous, because it is liable to force infectious material back into the inner ear tubes. This is, however, an erroneous belief.

Snuffing back and "hawking" has a tendency to clear the mouths of the inner ear tubes as well as the nasal passages.

On the other hand, improper use of nasal douches or cups in cleaning the nose is fraught with danger, since infectious material may in this manner be forced into the inner ear, setting up inflammatory reactions.

An important remedy when using a spray or a douche for cleaning the nose is to keep the mouth open and to refrain from swallowing until the upper respiratory tract has been cleared by snuffing back.

The open position of the mouth tends to pinch the inner openings of the ear tubes tight, thus preventing the entrance of foreign substances into the eustachian tubes. The act of swallowing tends to open the tubes.

The suffering due to a cold may be much decreased and the danger of complications somewhat lessened by keeping the nasal passages clear.

Chats With Parents

"TOO YOUNG"

Judith's mother enrolled her at the age of three in a nursery school. Such, however, was the violence of her emotion when on the first morning it was necessary to say goodbye that her mother decided she must be too young to bear the separation.

Nursery school and kindergarten would have to wait until she had developed sufficiently to make the break without undue upheaval.

It is safe to say that that time will never come. The more Judith is permitted to depend upon her mother's being constantly near, the more painful will be the break when at last it is made.

Although it is true that children do not develop uniformly, it is also true that any normal three-year-old should be able to accept temporary separation from his mother without experiencing too great a sense of loss.

The child who really suffers intensely over such separation is rare in spite of the fact that home training usually tends to emphasize the dependence of the child upon its mother.

Usually the tears and sobs vanish as soon as she is out of sight. Indeed anyone who has watched the farewells during the first weeks of the nursery school session cannot help but realize that even two and three year olds are fully aware of the value of a scene in giving them the center of the stage.

Sometimes during the first days a child may regularly cry for a little while after his mother has gone but his unhappiness soon diminishes and disappears.

With a week his sorrow has given place to a feeling of security in the presence of a friendly teacher and an eager interest in the many play opportunities planned specially to suit his needs.

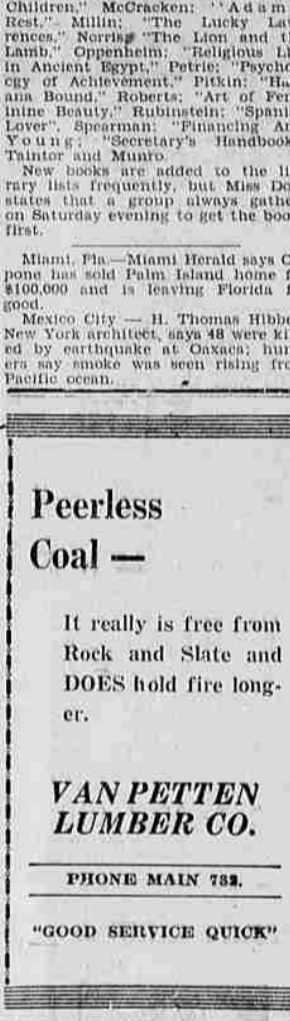
