2 Airmen Killed At Risalpur, India

LAHORE, India, Jan. 20 (AP)—Two military airmen were killed at Risalpur today when their plane collided at a height of 800 feet with an eagle with wings reaching eight feet from tip to tip. One airman jumped but his parachute failed to open. The other was killed in the crash.

The plane was coming down from a formation flight when it struck the eagle at 800 feet height and broke a wing. Flight Sergeant R. Wren was killed when the machine crashed and Corporal Jeff Ryan when his parachute failed to open.
