upon the actual capital invested as might be determined by congress, or with its authority by the commission. A rate of not less than 5 per cent nor more than 7 per cent is suggested.

"The corporation should be permitted to retain from its earnings not exceeding 2 per cent per annum on its invested capital.

"It should be required by law that alcoholic liquors for beverage, medicinal or sacramental purposes of over one-half of one per cent alcoholic content by volume (not including industrial alcohol) might be manufactured, imported, exported, transported in interstate commerce, or sold solely by the national corporation, or its branches.

"The corporation should only be allowed to make sales and shipment of such liquors in any state to a corporate agency created by such state, similar in general character to the national corporation, for the purpose of the purchase and distribution of local sale of such liquors within the state if and to the extent permitted by the laws thereof.

"The state at its option elected not to adopt the system it could establish or continue prohibition, in which event it would have to enforce its own laws within the state, but the federal law would not permit sales or shipments into that state by the national corporation except through the state in bond. Every aspect of the operations outlined would be subject to the control and regulation of the commission and appropriate penalties would be prescribed for violations of the law or of such regulations.

"The price at which the various liquors should be sold by the national corporation should be fixed or approved by the commission after hearing in proper cases. The prices should be based primarily upon and scaled upward on the basis of alcohol content liquor such as light wine and beer, and the highest prices practicable on high alcoholic content liquors, such as whiskeys and brandies.

"The prices should be such as, on the one hand to limit the use and, on the other hand, not high enough to permit the illegal traffic in or sale of such liquors. The price should be as nearly uniform as possible throughout the country.

"The national corporation should

sell and transport only to state agencies created for the purpose of local distribution and sale within the state. This would be entirely optional with the state. If any state desired to establish or continue prohibition it could do so. In that event it would have to enforce its own law within the state, but would be protected by the federal government from any supply from outside. If a state elected to go into the national system, it would create a state commission and a state corporation similar in character and structure to the national agencies discussed with similar powers and functions within the state. The state agencies would have to conform in general outline to a plan prescribed by the national commission in order to insure uniformity throughout the country as to matters of general consequence, but as to local questions they would be subject entirely to state control and could easily be adapted to the varied social and economic conditions within the state.

"Matters of price, return and other financial and operating details within the state would be controlled by the state commission along the same lines as already discussed, and the surplus revenues from operations within the state would go into the state treasury as a special fund to be disposed of by the legislature of the state.

"The state could permit local option as to the establishment of a sales agency in any given community. These agencies should be in buildings where no other commercial activity is carried on, should be open only at certain hours of the day, on such business days as might be prescribed by state law or regulation.

"Sales should be limited to persons holding license books, which should be issued by the state agency nearest the fixed abode or voting place of the holder under regulations to be prescribed by the commission. The holder should be required to sign an agreement in this book to account for the purchases made thereunder at any time on request and to the satisfaction of the state corporation or state commission.

"The amount of wine and beer fixed from time to time by the appropriate commission might or might not be limited to a reasonable quantity in any month, having a regard to the proposed use by the purchaser with a view to limiting the use and preventing purchases for illegitimate purposes.

"Upon conviction for violation of the commission, the holder should cause provided by law, the book

should be cancelled for such time as might be prescribed. All state and national regulations should seek to restrict sales and use as far as may be done, with leaving a possible demand which could be supplied at a profit by bootleggers. No advertisement of alcoholic liquors or solicitations of purchasers should be permitted.

The excess revenues from the operations of the national corporation would go into the federal treasury, and those from the operations of the state corporation and its branches would go into the state treasury. These revenues, which now go entirely to the lawless and criminal classes, would undoubtedly be very large. They would be subject to disposition by congress and the state legislature respectively. They should be set aside as special funds in the respective treasuries, and used for educational purposes, especially as to the evils resulting from the use of alcoholic beverages and for the eradication and prevention of those conditions which cause excessive drinking, or which tend to create a demand for intoxicating beverages.

and in its stead is the flight of John and Kenneth Hunter, who flew for 208 hours, 42 minutes.

Of the five world records recognized by the F. A. I. as the best performances in aeronautics, three were set in 1930 and two a year before.

These include the longest nonstop duration flight of 67 hours and 13 minutes by Maurice Goussard, of Occochee, Italy; the longest nonstop distance in a closed circuit of 5082.27 miles by the same aviator, and Lieut. Souce's airplane altitude record.

The 1929 marks were set by the longest nonstop distance in a straight line, 4912.795 miles, by Lieutenant Coetz and Maurice Belletie; and the greatest speed over a given base, 357.723 miles an hour, by Squadron Leader A. H. Orlebar, of Great Britain.

LEGISLATORS WAITING FOR MAJOR BILLS

across the Rogue river on the Roosevelt coast highway near Gold Beach the Isaac Lee Patterson bridge, to be so dedicated by appropriate ceremonies in August to the 38th legislative assembly by a concurrent resolution by Representatives, Hamilton, Howard, Knapp, Norton and Senator Hall. The resolution points out that the late Governor Patterson was greatly interested and aided in the construction of the coast highway and in the project of building the bridge.

Select Nine Directors—The selection of nine directors by appointment of the governor for the board of Portland is provided in the bill introduced by Representatives Keasey, Gill, Lewis and Gordon and Senators Woodward, Bennett and Staples. It bears the emergency clause and would be effective as soon as signed by the governor. The original act named the nine members of the board. Members of the board of commissioners would take office immediately upon selection, the term to be for four years except that the first four named would serve until the first Monday in June, 1933 and the last five members to the first Monday in June, 1935.

The dates of the closed fishing season in the Columbia river west of its confluence with the Deschutes would be changed by a bill introduced by Senator Frankovich and Representatives Heilberg and Mark Johnson.

The first of the nightly meetings of the joint ways and means committee was held to consider appropriations for the operation of the state for the next two years. Sam Koser, state budget director, explained the biennial budget estimates to the group, but no action on the estimates was taken.

The second public hearing on important legislation has been set for next Monday morning at the state house on the senate bill introduced by W. E. Buerke of Yamhill county. His measure calls for the repeal of the law requiring certificates of convenience and necessity by utilities entering competitive territory. The first public hearing will be held on Tuesday night on the senate bill on closing of Rogue river to commercial fishing.

Appropriation of \$25,000 for a survey of potential markets for cheap hydro-electric power, to be made by the University of Oregon, was asked in a bill presented by Representative David C. Glass of Wasco county. The act would determine the location of mineral deposits of commercial value in their relation to sources of electric energy. The location of the survey is along the Columbia river and its tributaries east of Bonneville, and within an economical range of a hydro-electric power plant.

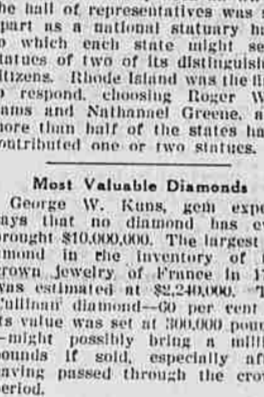
A bill providing for the creation of a state department of agriculture by the consolidation of all existing state departments of agriculture and horticulture and livestock activities is now under the scrutiny of the joint legislative committee on natural resources and apparently will undergo extensive revision before it is introduced.

The bill tentatively proposed a department headed by director appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate, who would receive a salary of \$60,000 a year. The department would be organized under five divisions which would be administrative control, laboratories, plant industry, animal industry, and markets and marketing. Over each division would be a chief appointed by the director with the consent of the governor, the director himself to serve on the division of administrative control without additional pay. 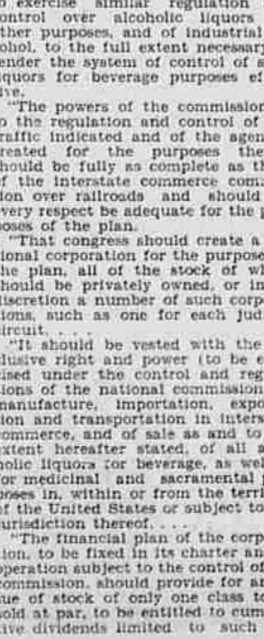

Statuary Hall

In 1864, at the suggestion of Senator Morrill of Vermont (then a member of the house) the room which had formerly been known as the hall of representatives was set apart as a national statuary hall in which each state might send statues of two of its distinguished citizens. Rhode Island was the first to respond, choosing Roger Williams and Nathaniel Greene, and more than half of the states have contributed one or two statues.

Most Valuable Diamonds—George W. Kuns, gem expert, says that a diamond has ever brought \$100,000. The largest diamond in the inventory of the crown jewelry of France in 1701 was estimated at \$2,240,000. The Cullinan diamond—60 per cent of its value was set at 300,000 pounds sterling. modified, congress would have full power (1) to continue the present system of absolute national prohibition, or (2) to remit the matter in whole or in part to the states, or (3) to adopt any system of effective control. Since greater flexibility is one of the outstanding needs of the present system, this modification would be made over the policy of absolute national prohibition is to be continued.

"That congress should then create a bi-partisan national commission on liquor control, which should have full power under such laws as congress might enact to regulate and control the manufacture, importation, exportation, transportation in interstate commerce, and also the sale, and to the extent hereinafter stated, of intoxicating liquors of more than one-half of one per centum alcoholic content, for beverage purposes; and to exercise similar regulation and control over alcoholic liquors for other purposes, and of industrial alcohol, to the full extent necessary to render the system of control of such liquors for beverage purposes effective.

"The powers of the commission as to the regulation and control of the traffic indicated and of the agencies created for the purposes thereof should be fully as complete as the powers of the interstate commerce commission over railroads and should in every respect be adequate for the purposes of the plan.

"That congress should create a national corporation for the purposes of the plan, all of the stock of which should be privately owned, or in the hands of a number of such corporations, such as one for each judicial circuit.

"It should be vested with the exclusive right and power (to be exercised under the control and regulations of the national commission) of manufacture, importation, exportation and transportation in interstate commerce, and of sale as and to the extent hereafter stated, of all alcoholic liquors for beverage, as well as for medicinal and sacramental purposes, in, within or from the territory of the United States or subject to the jurisdiction thereof.
