UNCLE SAM TO LEND MILLERS WHEAT SUPPLY

CHICAGO, Jan. 21 (AP)—Plans were in the making here for the government sponsored grain stabilization corporation to lend American millers several million bushels of wheat.

Bishop Cannon Is Facing New Probe

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Representative Tinkham, Republican, Massachusetts, plans to submit to the senate campaign funds committee charges against Bishop James M. Cannon which the senate lobby committee found it did not have authority to investigate.

Tinkham said that since the senate had authorized the Nye campaign committee to investigate all phases of the 1928 campaign he would renew the charges he had made before the lobby committee.

These involve alleged violations of the corrupt practices act, alleged misuse of \$36,000 and other offenses attributed to the bishop by Tinkham.

Influenza Almost Doubles In Week

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Influenza almost doubled last week in 10 states reporting to the public health service.

The report showed 2,022 cases as compared with 1,048 the previous week. A year ago the total was 593 cases in the 10 states.

In New York 1,005 cases were reported.

New Wires Spread To Speed Reports

WASHINGTON (AP)—A net of 8500 miles of automatic telegraph type-writer circuits will be spread by the federal government by July 1 for collecting and disseminating weather information for aviators.

With nearly 6000 miles of circuits in operation, authorization has been given by the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce for an additional 2543 miles. Forty-nine new automatic telegraph-writer stations will be established.

One circuit will stretch across Pennsylvania from Pittsburgh to Camden and Newark. N. J.; Hagerstown, Md., and Washington, D. C.

Twelve stations will be established in Oregon and Washington on the Seattle-Portland-Pasco airway. A third circuit will connect Los Angeles and Wichita, Kan., while a division will be made in a mid-western circuit to add stations from Pittsburgh through Ohio.

Radio telephone stations at Kingman, Ariz.; Winslow, Ariz.; Albuquerque, N. M.; Clovis, N. M.; and Wynona, Okla., will be operated in conjunction with the automatic circuit to be installed from Los Angeles to Wichita.

Removal of Pigeon Point Reef Begins

MARSHFIELD, Jan. 21 (AP)—The first actual step in the removal of Pigeon Point reef was taken Tuesday when dolphins were driven for location purposes near the scene of operations.

The \$125,000 appropriated by congress some time ago for the work is now available. Approximately ten months time will be needed for the work.

Pigeon Point reef is the last formidable obstruction in the inner harbor on Coos bay.

OKLAHOMA FARMERS FORM SILAGE CUTTING 'OUTFIT'

CHICKASHA, Okla. (AP)—Like the threshing outfits that harvest wheat in other communities, farmers of this neighborhood are using an ensilage cutter to fill their silos.

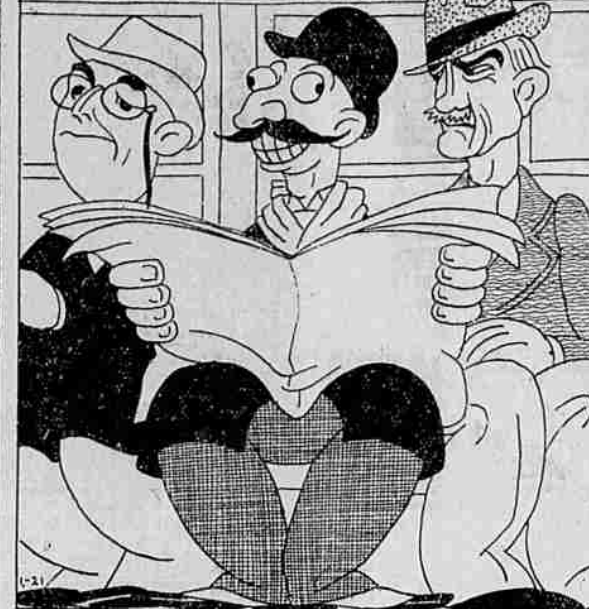

Coloring of Oleo Upheld By Company

PORTLAND, Jan. 21 (AP)—Coloring of oleomargarine to the likeness of butter is defended in an attack filed on the Oregon law in federal district court here by Durkee Famous Foods, Inc.

The suit seeks to restrain the state dairy and food commissioner from enforcing the law prohibiting manufacture and sale of oleomargarine artificially colored to imitate butter.

Naming its own product, the Illinois corporation declares the word "oleomargarine" is printed in bold face letters on the package, and contends this is sufficient to let the consumer know the nature of the product.
