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NEW ANIMALS Man is improving upon nature even in animal life. His wonders achieved in the creation of new and better fruits, flowers and vegetables and grains are known to all, but the public is not yet as well informed on what is being accomplished with animals.

One of the most recently evolved of the world's new animals is the dox, an Australian cross between the dingo and the fox. The swoose is a cross of the goose and the swan.

In Canada two new farm animals have been produced through inter-breeding. One is a cattalo, a stabilized cross between the American bison and Hereford, Angus and Short-horn cows.

If ever your people think seriously of going in for such insurance let them first visit England and Germany and see how inefficiently it has worked out. It slows down industry and promotes idleness."

Progress is being made in certain industries, and with the best thought of both capital and labor being focused on this problem results are bound to materialize that will benefit all.
