The smart set, garbed in black from head to toe, has been tired of the all-sable costume for weeks but did not know what to do about it. Now it finds the answer in light satin tunics, bright crepe frocks, ray scarves and hats, and colored jewel accessories, and the woman who would be smart is adding these to her wardrobe.

The color of her eyes plays an important part in her choice. Under her all-black coat the blue-eyed Parisienne is wearing to tea a frock of periwinkle blue crepe or a seventh-eighteenth century gown of aquamarine with a close-fitting little chapeau to match.

The brown-eyed girl chooses a frock with a pale rose bodice incrustated on a black skirt, coral earrings and bracelets; while the blond whose eyes have a greenish glint chooses a frock with a pale blue bodice and a black skirt, coral earrings and a bright blue feather in the hat she wears with sapphire earrings.

SMART KNICK-KNACKS ARE MOST DECEPTIVE

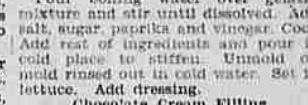

- By Mrs. Alexander George DATE CAKE FOR SUNDAY Breakfast Grapefruit Waffles and Honey Broiled Salmon Coffee Dinner Roast of Lamb and Canned Potatoes Buttered Cabbage Bread Mint Jelly Vegetable Salad in Gelatin Salad Dressing Coffee Supper Chocolate Cream Pie Coffee Fruit Salad Salted Water Date Cake Coffee Vegetable Salad in Gelatin 1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture. 2 cups boiling water. 1 teaspoon salt. 4 teaspoons sugar. 1/2 teaspoon paprika. 2 tablespoons vinegar. 1 cup cooked peas. 1 cup raw carrots (grated). 1/2 cup chopped celery. 1 tablespoon chopped onions. 2 tablespoons chopped sweet pickle. Pour boiling water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Add salt, sugar, paprika and vinegar. Cool. Add rest of ingredients and pour in cold place to stiffen. Unmold on platter rinsed out in cold water. Set in lettuce. Add dressing. Chocolate Cream Filling 2-3 cup sugar. 1 tablespoon flour. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1 1/2 squares chocolate, melted. 2 cups milk. 2 egg yolks. 1 teaspoon vanilla. 2 egg whites, beaten. Blend sugar, flour, salt and chocolate. Add milk and egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until thick and

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creamy. Stir frequently. Fold in rest of ingredients. Pour into baked pie shell. Bake in a slow oven. Cool and spread with whipped cream. Date Cake (A moist cake) 1 egg. 1 cup sugar. 1 tablespoon butter, melted. 1 teaspoon vanilla. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 cup nuts. 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. 2-3 cup dates. 1 cup boiling water. 2 1/4 cups flour. 1 teaspoon soda. 1/4 teaspoon baking powder. Four boiling water over dates. Cook slowly one minute. Stir constantly. Beat egg and add sugar and butter. Add all other ingredients, including date mixture. Beat two minutes. Pour into loaf pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 40 minutes in slow oven.
