- By Mrs. Alexander George A COMPANY DINNER MENU Oyster Cocktail Lemon Quarters Sautéed Walrus Roast Pork and Braised Sweet Potatoes Spiced Peaches Currant Jelly Hot Biscuit Butter Pear Gelatin Salad Chopped Bars Chocolate Marshmallow Squares Whipped Cream Coffee Cocktail Sauce, Serving 8 1/2 cup chili sauce, 4 tablespoons mayonnaise, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 tablespoons catsup, 2 tablespoons horseradish, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Mix and chill ingredients. Serve on oysters chilled and arranged in glass cups, lined with lettuce. Pear Gelatin Salad, Serving 8 1 package orange-flavored gelatin mixture, 2 cups boiling water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 8 halves canned pears, 1/2 cup red cherries. Pour boiling water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice. Pour to the thickness of 1/2 inch in a shallow pan which has been rinsed in cold water. Set in cool place. When a little stiff, add pears and cherries. Chill until stiff. Cut in squares. Chocolate Marshmallow Squares 1-3 cup fat, 1 cup sugar, 2 squares chocolate, melted.

Girl Who 'Flunked' Film Chance Leaps Back Into Clara Bow's Role

year-old Sylvia Sidney stormed the citadels of Hollywood, and her second attempt has brought stardom. With her black eyes, beautiful voice and voluptuous figure, she has replaced the original 'It' girl, Clara Bow, to co-star with Gary Cooper in his new picture.

A graduate of the Theatre Guild school of acting, Miss Sidney won her first Broadway honors at the age of 16, when she was praised for her performance in "Crime."

The deep, intense voice and stage performance of this young girl, daughter of a New York dentist, established her as one of the theatre's most sought-after ingenues.

Her playing in "Gods of the Lightning" was lauded by critics as one of the finest of the season, and it brought her first movie contract.

Off she went to Hollywood, but not for long, and she came back to the

stage. She played the lead in "Cross Roads," and then was cast for the starring role in "Bad Girls," the play based on Vina Delmar's novel. The movie magnates were so impressed by her performance they decided that perhaps they had made a mistake the first time. So they signed Miss Sidney again, and she arrived in the studio just in time to take the throne vacated by Miss Bow.

Although she has been on the stage only four years, she has played almost continually during that time. Even her "vacations" are usually spent in Denver, where she has been guest star with a stock company.

She and her mother look almost exactly alike, and they are always together. She speaks French well, and is a diligent student of French literature. She often gives tea for her friends, but seldom grants dates.

Mrs. Leone Bowles, Portland society matron, died in Miss Loucks' apartment last November after a head knife had been plunged into her breast. Her husband and Miss Loucks, who were in the apartment at the time, claimed she stabbed herself.

The millionaire and his former secretary last week pleaded not guilty to the first degree murder charged in the indictment. They also were indicted on statutory charges to which they have not yet entered pleas.

Although the mercury slipped back to 32 above last night—two degrees colder than the night before—it was climbing rapidly this morning, and the day opened with a nearly clear sky.

Maximum reports from western cities yesterday included Baker 42 above, Boise 44, Denver 52, Helena 52, Juneau 49, Los Angeles 60, Marshallfield 70, Medford 52, Phoenix 70, Portland 64, Postville 49, Roseburg 66, Sacramento 58, Salt Lake City 56, San Diego 74, San Francisco 64, Seaside 54, Spokane 50, Walla Walla 62 and Yakima 46.
