

VENUE CHANGE IS ASKED FOR BOWLES TRIAL

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30 (P)—Attorneys for Nelson G. Bowles, millionaire, and Irma Loucks, his former secretary, charged with the murder of Mrs. Leone Bowles, will ask for a change of venue from Multnomah county, they announced yesterday.

John Collier, of defense counsel, said affidavits signed by two thousand persons will accompany the motion, which will be filed today if work on the affidavits is completed in time.

Collier said he will base his motion on the contention Bowles and Loucks could not be given a fair and impartial trial here, because of public feeling in the case.

Indications the county grand jury was making further investigation of the case were seen yesterday when George Mowry, deputy district attorney, and Mrs. Mable Way and Mr. and Mrs. G. P. Stevenson appeared at the grand jury room.

Mrs. Way was the personal maid of Mrs. Bowles. The Stevensons live next door to Mrs. Loucks' apartment where Mrs. Bowles was stabbed to death.

Edward Hinch, detained in connection with alleged attacks on Mrs. H. W. Howard, state witness in the case, was released yesterday.

Wild Party Alleged to Have Taken Place On Board Battleship Oregon

SALEM, Jan. 30 (P)—Liquor drinking and acts of immorality alleged to have taken place at a dance on board the battleship Oregon in the Portland harbor, were charged in a letter read before the joint ways and means committee last night. The committee placed the blame for such occurrences upon the Portland city administration, and held it responsible for the reported failure of the city to cooperate, as provided by law.

Captain Cicero Hogan, of Portland, representing the Veterans of Foreign Wars, accompanied by representatives of other veterans' organizations, pleaded with the committee not to withdraw the \$15,000 annual continuing appropriation for maintenance of the ship, which, he said, he understood was to be proposed in a bill to be introduced by Senator Woodward. Hogan said that both the states of Washington and California want the ship and that "it would be an insult for Oregon to break faith with the United States government" by withdrawing the appropriation.

Woodward replied that he did not contemplate such a bill, but had made a provision for the city of Portland, the dock commission and the port of Portland have broken faith with the state," he said, "for they have failed to give the ship suitable moorage and furnish light and water aboard as provided by law."

Letter Relates Charges.

Woodward read a letter on the stationery of the McCormack Lumber company, signed by McDonald Potts, in which it was charged that liquor drinking and immorality were indulged in at a dance attended by about 300 employees of a large industrial concern. Police had to be called, the letter said.

Hogan said the letter was an indictment against the city of Portland and not the state of Oregon. With this Woodward agreed. Hogan also said that he was a member of a committee that had visited Mayor George L. Baker during the day, and that the mayor had promised that the city commission were all agreed that a better location should be furnished the ship. It is understood this is to be at the east end of the Morrison street bridge.

The secretary of the ways and means committee was instructed to write the Portland commission reminding it of its duty relative to maintenance and requesting that the city reimburse the state for money paid on light and water accounts.

Appropriation Requests.

Attorney General H. Van Winkle, State Treasurer T. B. Kay and Chairman Charles V. Galloway of the state tax commission were called before the committee and closely quizzed as to appropriation requests appearing in the budget. These departments ask respectively \$65,810, \$32,052 and \$153,810. The latter is an increase of \$47,998. Galloway explained that the increase was on the assumption that the department would have to equip itself to collect a state income tax. If the intangibles tax is re-enacted he said the request will have to be increased.

Galloway was questioned closely as to the commission's intentions relative to the intangibles. He said two bills had been prepared. One would

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (P)—Representative Korell, of Oregon, has asked the house veterans' affairs hospital sub-committee to expedite his measure for a \$125,000 administrative building for the veterans' hospital in Portland.

Korell said the entire first floor of the institution is now being used for administration work, while the reception room on the second floor also occupies space usable for beds.

The construction of an administrative building, he said, would permit installation of eighty additional beds on the first floor, and 28 beds on the second floor.
