During illness all energy is concentrated on the task of overcoming the disease. Growth suffers a setback, or at best, is arrested. To enable the child to catch up, its routine should be so modified as to place a minimum tax upon its strength. So important is this practice that in recent years convalescent homes have been developed as adjuncts to hospitals, and children who have undergone severe ordeals such as are represented by whooping cough and rheumatic fever are sent to the convalescent home to recuperate. While these are gross exaggerations, the principle is equally valid in milder diseases. Every home can be made into a convalescent home for the child recovering from an attack of illness. The convalescent child should be fed an appropriate diet. Its physical activities should be kept down to a minimum unless there are wants to the contrary. It should be given every opportunity to be out in the fresh air. Above all, it should have an adequate amount of rest and sleep.

They insist that every child who has been ill should be allowed time to recover before being put into the ordinary "run of things." This idea is valid in all cases of illness, but particularly so in children, for the child has a double job of both living and growing.

ALABAMA BULLFROGS RANK AS 'LIVESTOCK' IN HAWAII. MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Here in Alabama they are just bullfrogs, but out in Hawaii they are ranked as livestock. The Alabama agricultural department reports that the Honolulu market alone handled 6000 pairs of frog legs in one recent week at 20 cents a pair, and several frog-raising organizations have been formed. The frogs were imported into Hawaii from Alabama and Louisiana to feed on certain insect pests, but have proved a profitable source of revenue to Hawaii frog takers who call them "mountain chickens."

COW ONCE WAS SCRIB. NOW IT'S CHAMPION RICH VALLEY, Minn. (AP)—When Henry Stammer spent a day at the South St. Paul stockyards he saw a scrub cow about to begin her death march to the slaughter house. He thought the animal had possibilities for his dairy farm so he bought it at the market price by weight. The cow now has completed a year with his herd and has won the high production record for his county. On a special diet the animal gave 6813 pounds of milk and 841.3 pounds of butter fat.
