Needy Farmers Soon Will Get Federal Loans

WASHINGTON (AP)—Application blanks for loans from the \$45,000,000 federal feed, seed and fertilizer fund being turned forward to county agricultural agents in the 1930 drought and storm area. They are to be issued only to those farmers who are in material damage and who have no other source of credit.

Each applicant will sign a note for the loan he desires, and at the same time, in case of failure to repay, he will give a mortgage on his 1931 crop to secure its repayment.

Need Determines Amount

The extent to which the applicant incurred damages from drought or storms during the last season will be the principal basis on which his eligibility for a loan will be determined.

He will agree to use the loan for the purchase of seed, fertilizer, feed for work stock and fuel and oil for the use of loans to purchase human foods.

When the applicant has completed his application, note and mortgage, the papers will be turned over to the county advisory committee, consisting of a leading banker and two prominent farmers who serve without pay.

They will determine whether the applicant has the necessary power and machinery to produce the crops he proposes to plant, what his reputation is as a farmer, and whether he can be expected to use his best efforts to produce a crop and repay the loan.

They then will make a definite recommendation to the department of agriculture field office which disburses the loans.

Check On Use of Money

The field office will examine the papers promptly and determine the amount of the loan. This will be based on needs of the individual for seed and fertilizer for the acreage and crops he proposes to plant, and for feed for work stock needed.

Butter Higher; Delivered Milk Down 2 Cents

Butter, which has been quoted at 29 cents for the past few days, took a leap on the market this morning and is now selling for from 30 cents to 32 cents a pound at the various local stores. As butter rises tomatoes, which are now being imported from Texas, drop from 35 cents to 25 cents a pound, and rhubarb also drops 10 cents below the formerly quoted 25 cent mark.

Lemons also dropped from 45 cents the dozen to 39 cents, while other prices remain the same and steady. The price of milk (delivered to the consumers home) dropped from 12 to 10 cents yesterday morning, as announced previously. The La Grande Dairy association announced the cut and other milk dealers matched it.

When a loan is approved, a check will be drawn to the borrower in the amount of the first installment of the loan. Before a second installment is paid, the borrower will be asked to show how he has expended the first. No loan will be made to a farmer to increase his major crop acreages.

NO CHANGES IN EGGS AND BUTTER TODAY

PORTLAND, Feb. 2 (AP)—Without changes from last weekend quotations, wholesale butter and egg markets opened today with trade none so unchanged for each. Butter market ruled firm under influence of limited supplies and an active demand. Eggs were steady, more than ample, demand fair and prices irregular.

Country dressed meats opened with hog and veal supplies more than demand and consequently hogs were offering at 12 1/2 cents a pound, 1/2 to 1 cent below Saturday's quotations, and veal ruled easier with a 1 cent weakening from a 15 cent top in some sales. Lambs were steady.

Poultry quotations were steady. Quotations on most fresh fruit and vegetables were steady. Lettuce weakened off 25 cents at \$2.50; \$1.25 a crate. Onion sets were quoted up 1/2 cent.
