PENNSYLVANIA TO CHANGE ATHLETICS

Entire Structure to be Reorganized Upon Basis of "Under-Emphasis"

By Edward J. Neil PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 3.—The entire athletic structure of the University of Pennsylvania will be reorganized upon a basis of "under-emphasis" in the most drastic single upheaval of Eastern intercollegiate sports history.

Control and management of athletics have been taken over completely by Thomas S. Gates, president of the university and his board of trustees while the sports themselves will be given back to the students.

Spring and pre-season training in football, training camps, training tables, dormitories for athletes, as well as scholarship and beyond that won in the classroom, have been wiped out in all sports except basketball.

Intercollegiate sports will be fostered with natural rivals on a year-round basis through the whole range of teams in each sport.

One department, physical education, will continue to exist as a part of the university.

In a 23-page bulletin published today, President Gates announced these changes, and accepted the report of an investigating committee.

The committee found that abolition of gate receipts would not furnish a cure for athletics, but suggested that gifts and subscriptions from alumni and friends, including donors to preferential treatment in the allotment of seats, might be some means of meeting expenses.

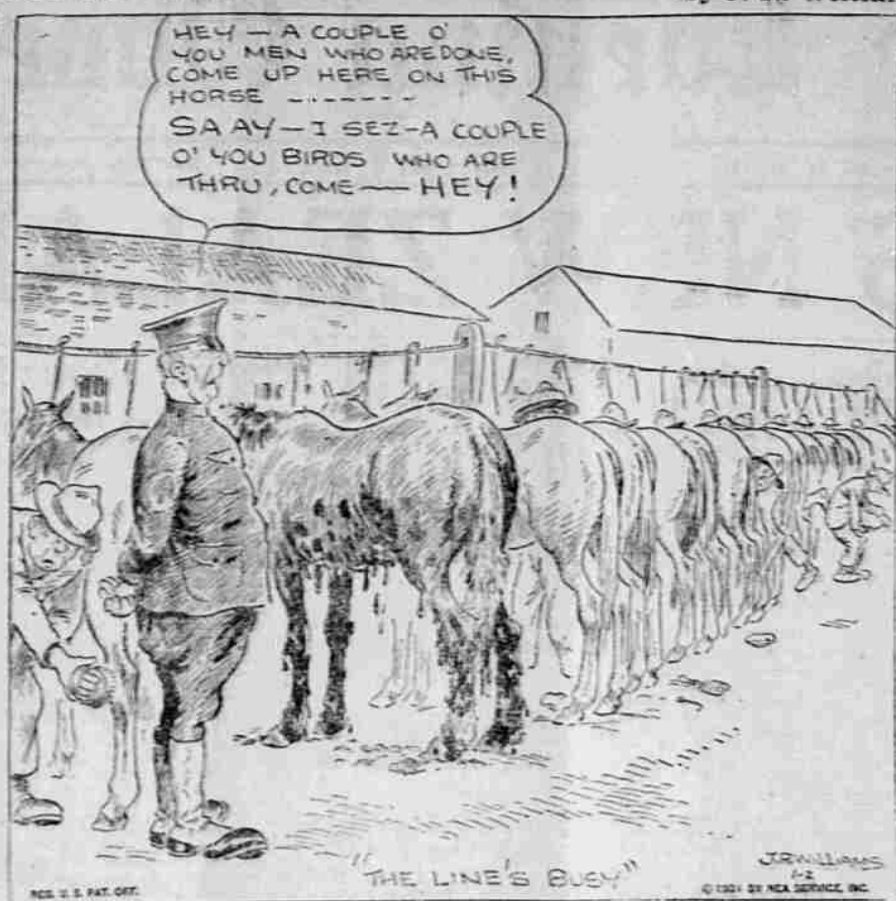

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By J. R. Williams Tests of Cattle

In Oregon During Last Year 71,494

SALEM, Feb. 3.—Tests of cattle for infectious abortion in Oregon during the past year extended that of any other state in the union with the possible exception of Wisconsin. Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, announced Saturday. The disease was found noticeably lessened in many counties, despite the fact that twice as many cattle were tested, he said. The total for the year was 71,494 tests.

The percentage average of reactors showed a slight increase, due to increased tests, Lytle stated. His reports showed 10.3 per cent reactivity as compared with 10.5 the year before. New milk stations at Portland, Medford, Eugene, Klamath Falls and Pendleton have stimulated the test work. Comparative figures showed that while everybody drinks milk, not everybody tests. There are 200 fatal automobile accidents every day in the state.
