Seeks Non-Partisan Judiciary
The Crawford non-partisan judiciary bill applies to supreme, circuit, and county judges, and to the county clerk. Neither the nominating petitions nor the ballot would make any reference to party affiliation with respect to the candidates. The names of all candidates for judgeships would be presented for nomination by individual nominating petitions or by declaration of candidacy and the payment of the fee as now or hereinafter provided by law, but subject to restrictions of the bill. Persons seeking re-election would have the right to use the words "present incumbent" after their names on the ballot.

Colonel Ivanhoe Dies About 1:30 THIS AFTERNOON
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In the recent political campaigns. Dr. and Mrs. Ivanhoe, farmers near Leesburg, Virginia, were the parents of a baby boy August 3, 1901. The child, a girl, came to America from their home in Scotland after they were married, and he went back, spending seven years in Edinburgh, graduating in the school of medicine. Dr. Ivanhoe didn't practice medicine much; too much of his time had to be spent on his property, but during the Civil War he and his son, who was later to be district attorney in two Oregon counties, visited many of the hospitals and the suffering from the battle fields. Many times Dr. Ivanhoe was consulted and his advice followed. He took his son with him to the hospital so that he might see the suffering and have an early beginning in the study of medicine, for he was to go to school and the doctor his father might have been.

But the son did not want to be a doctor, the horror and wretchedness of the hospitals did not appeal to him.

Colonel Ivanhoe (then a young boy) did not go to school until he was nearing his twenties, but received a sound basic education in Latin, Greek, mathematics and a Scotchman who lived on his father's farm and taught school. When he thought his father was preparing to send him away to a medical school he ran away from home. This was the only subject he and his father disagreed upon, otherwise the colonel's mathematics and Latin, thinking him the most brilliant man he knew. Even as a boy in his teens, the colonel followed his own line, because he knew he could not endure being a doctor. He never went home again until 1910, forty years later, and another trip was made in 1920.

Attended University
He spent two years and a half attending Planners University in Richmond which ran day and night. He received a certificate. Classical and scientific courses were studied at the university. When he was 20 years old he quit school and joined the army, that was in 1870, where he remained until 1887 when he married Amanda E. Eldridge and came to Oregon.

While on a fishing trip in the Wallawa country, Colonel Ivanhoe took his first case which caused him to start law practice there. While fishing along a stream, two men came to him and, saying that they had heard he was a lawyer, asked him to plead their case as the lawyer they had secured was indisposed. At first he was hesitant, but becoming convinced of their innocence, offered to act for them, and won the case easily.

Offices in Joseph, Enterprise
He held several more cases in Wallawa county before coming and setting up his offices in Joseph, until the county seat was changed to Enterprise. For about ten years he and Dan W. Sheahan were partners, Mr. Sheahan staying in Wallawa county while Mr. Ivanhoe moved to La Grande.

When he first came to La Grande, the main line was the nearest railroad to the Wallawa country, and there were many buildings where the business district now is located, and the country was principally used for stock raising. In his words, there seemed to be just two classes of people, the stock raisers and the stock stealers. Many of his first cases dealt with the stealing of stock.

With the years, the Colonel became a leading lawyer in this section, and was district attorney for nine years, 1895 to 1904, until he resigned. Many persons can remember his voice as it rang out in the courtroom, pleading and demanding for his client.

Colonel in Militia
He received the title of colonel when he was appointed colonel over the militia just after coming to this section of Oregon.

This brave old soldier-lawyer never drank or smoked, rode a bicycle or did any of the more flippant things of life. Even if not a doctor he was as wise as one in keeping his body and mind free of contamination.

He had two boys, Forrest and Lytton. Forrest was a lieutenant in the navy in 1930, and Lytton was private secretary to the general manager, and general manager of the finance department of what is said to be the largest motor company in South America. His oldest son was born Feb. 29, 1898, and the other about two years later in the month of November. Both of them are married.

The Colonel married Jean Ruby Moore October 30, 1919, and she is left to mourn his loss, along with his two sons and five grandchildren. Grace Lou, Roberta, Lytton P. and Francis, all children of Lytton Ivanhoe and Richard Eldridge, son of Forrest Ivanhoe.

He was a member of the I. O. O. F., Rebekahs, Elks, P. S. and the K. K. K.

dollar a bushel on his grain, compared to the 68 cent price set by the stabilization corporation as the minimum price, and the 34 cents quoted at Vancouver, B. C.

Two Fugitives Shot To Death By Police
NEW YORK, Feb. 3 (AP)—Shot down at the end of a breakneck, 50-mile chase through three counties, two convict fugitives were dead and another was back in prison.

Charles Sirico, 27, and James Clark, 26, were killed Sunday by Bronx police as they covered in a taxicab at 242nd street and Broadway. Peter Reynolds was beaten into submission in Yonkers, N. Y., a few minutes before when the convicts' car tumbled into a ditch. Their lookout, John Credon, was seized on the spot of their latest crime in Beacon, N. Y.

The first three accomplices by William Rapp, of Yonkers, escaped from Eastview penitentiary in the midst of holiday festivities last Christmas eve and fled into the woods near White Plains, N. Y. Rapp was re-captured last week in Yonkers.

President Opposed To Relief Measure

The text of the president's remarks was:

"Certain senators have issued a public statement to the effect that unless the president and the house of representatives agree to appropriate local government as distinct from charitable purposes they will force an extra session of congress."

"I do not wish to add acrimony to a discussion, but would rather state this case as I see its fundamentals."

"This is not an issue as to whether people shall go hungry or cold in the United States. It is solely a question of the best method by which hunger and cold shall be prevented."

It is a question as to whether the American people on one hand will maintain the spirit of charity and mutual self help through voluntary giving and the responsibility of local government as distinguished on the other hand from appropriations out of the federal treasury for such purposes.

"My own conviction is strongly that we break down this sense of responsibility of individual generosity to individual and mutual self help in this country in times of national difficulty, and it is solely a question of the best method by which hunger and cold shall be prevented."

"I have indeed spent much of my life in fighting hardship and starvation both abroad and in the southern states. I do not feel that I should be charged with lack of human sympathy for those who suffer but I recall that in all the organizations with which I have been connected over these many years, the foundation has been to summon the maximum of self help."

"I will accede to those who advocate federal charity, a natural anxiety for the people of their states. I am willing to pledge myself that if the time should ever come that the voluntary agencies of the country try together with the local and state governments are unable to find resources with which to prevent hunger and suffering in my country, I will ask the aid of every resource of the federal government because I would no more see starvation or want among our countrymen than would any senator or congressman. I have the faith in the American people that such a day will not come."

HOUSE CONSIDERS MANY NEW BILLS
Asked to Investigate Holding Companies, Bank Corporations.

SALEM, Feb. 3 (AP)—Immediate investigation of the activities and operations of holding companies and bank corporations affiliated, or which have interlocking directorates with savings and loan associations or building and loan associations, is demanded in a resolution introduced in the house yesterday by Representative Perry O. De Lap, Klamath county.

The investigation is for the purpose of showing the relationship between such saving and loan associations and building and loan associations, and such holding companies or bank corporations, with particular respect to stock ownership and interlocking stock holdings and directorates, together with a list of members of depositors whose funds have been withdrawn and invested in stocks or bonds of affiliated companies, with their names and addresses and amounts withdrawn. The report will contain a schedule of items, representing securities of all classes which have been purchased or transferred from any saving and loan association or affiliated company.
