Thirty Million Acres of Wheat Sown in India

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (Special).—Interest of the grain trade in India as a potential exporter of wheat during the coming crop year, is stimulated by the release of the first estimate of the area sown, which places the Indian wheat acreage at 30,364,000 acres, as compared with the first estimate of 29,319,000 acres a year ago, according to the Grain Market News Service of the United States Bureau of agricultural economics.
This estimate of acreage, however, represents roughly only about 98 per cent of the total Indian wheat acreage, and during the past five years the final estimate has ranged from 1,000,000 to 2,000,000 acres above the first estimate released in January.
Sowing of the Indian crop was completed by the middle of December, but germination on unirrigated land, which comprises roughly one-half of the Indian acreage, was retarded by lack of moisture, and the condition of the crop as a whole has been rather unfavorable. General and beneficial rains have recently occurred in the Punjab province, which contains around one-third of the Indian acreage. In the United Provinces, however, which include about one-fifth of the Indian acreage, and rank next to the Punjab in importance, the moisture supply is still deficient.
Kharif, formerly the greatest wheat exporting port of the British empire, has suffered severely during the last few years, and has been surpassed in wheat exports by other ports, in both the Dominion of Canada and the Commonwealth of Australia. Following the record Indian harvest of 1926, when production amounted to 370,000,000 bushels, Indian exporters and shipping companies looked forward to a marked increase in wheat exports. Shipments for the season to date, however, have totaled only some 10,000,000 bushels.
This small outboard movement has been largely the result of the very low prevailing prices, which have made it unprofitable for Indian producers to sell wheat in world markets. Choice White Kharif Indian wheat has recently been quoted in British markets at 76c per bushel, as compared with ex-ship quotations of 79c for No. 1 Manitoba Northern, 68c for Argentine Rosado, 76c for Australian, and 67c for

Freight rates from interior points in India were lowered last November, from around 10c per bushel to 11c per bushel, with the emergency rates to remain in effect until February, 1931, in an effort to facilitate the movement of the remaining Indian surplus, of around 37,000,000 bushels before the heavy movement began from southern hemisphere countries. Exports of wheat from India have practically ceased, however, and should prospects for the next season's output continue unfavorable, such surplus as otherwise would be available for export might be retained for domestic consumption during the next crop year.

Some Australian wheat is annually imported into India, usually for blending purposes, but trade experts indicate that more than the usual amount has been received during recent months, as a result of the lower ocean freights on the Australian wheat, as compared with the higher rail freights on Indian wheat from surplus to deficit areas. Sales of Australian wheat to India for January-February shipment have recently been made at around 70-75c per bushel.

Butter Prices Advance Today; Receipts Light
PORTLAND, Feb. 3 (AP)—Continued light receipts of fresh butter brought about another general advance of prices on the produce exchange. Quotations opened today 1 cent higher on all grades. Demand was good. Especially for 89 to 91 score cubes. Quote: extras, 28c; standards, 28c; prime firsts, 27c and firsts, 26c. Simultaneous with the butter advance, Portland creameries announced 1 and 2 cent advances in butterfat bids to a uniform 26 cents a pound, delivered.
Egg quotations opened unchanged with receipts ample, demand active and some price shading evident.
Poultry market held steady while in the country dressed meats trade veal and lamb were steady while hogs were quoted a cent lower at 12 to 12 1/2 cents a pound to producers due to light demand for the fore part of the week.
Conditions in the fruit and vegetable markets were reported by the government market news service as follows:
Willamette and Tualatin valley Burbank potatoes are moving in limited volume to California points, where they are meeting with very favorable reception. Only the best stock is being shipped. Oregon growers are now receiving about 90 cents per cwt., plus bags for their No. 1 Burbanks. Idaho primary markets declined again, to 80-85c for No. 1 regressed Russets.

WILL INTRODUCE POLICE MEASURE

and Pennsylvania operate, sponsors for the measure declared.
Appoint superintendent
The measure, if passed, would be the act of the department at a salary of \$5000 a year, and he would appoint a deputy superintendent at a salary of \$3000 a year. Both would be required to give bonds in the amount of \$20,000. The deputy would possess all of the powers of and perform all of the duties of a superintendent in the absence of the latter.
As to the organization of the force itself the bill provides that the "superintendent" with the approval of the board of police commissioners, shall be authorized and directed to appoint a state police force, consisting of such number of officers and privates as shall in the governor and said superintendent be required or necessary in the performance of the duties required by this act. Said department of police shall consist of a headquarter, and central bureau of identification and information composed of such administrative and office force and such captains, lieutenants, sergeants, corporals, privates and recruits as the governor and said superintendent of state police shall deem necessary and expedient.
Salary provisions
It is specified that the salaries of captains shall not exceed \$3000 a year, lieutenants \$2400 a year, sergeants \$2000 a year, corporals \$1800 a year, privates \$1200 a year and recruits in training \$1200 a year.
All officers and privates shall be appointed by the superintendent for periods of three years and shall be removable upon charges preferred and heard, or for "the good of the service." All officers shall be citizens of the United States and "preferably a resident of the state of Oregon." Candidates for the force would be required to pass a physical and mental examination "based upon the standard provided by the rules and regulations of the United States army," but the superintendent is given authority to waive the physical standard provided.
Uniforms and needed equipment of state police officers would be provided by the state with responsibility for their care and preservation imposed upon the officers.

URGE ACTION ON STARKEY, UKIAH ROAD

If completed, it would give La Grande a route into Central Oregon. To Mr. Couch this part seems to be a state, public bureau and forest service proposition.

Charles H. Reynolds spoke next, stating that the chamber of commerce should do something on this matter. He said that the chamber has been asleep for the last few years as far as road matters are concerned with the exception of the Mt. Emily scenic road. He pointed out that Klamath Falls was securing a \$150,000 appropriation and believes that this chamber could also secure consideration. "Other districts are getting it, but we are not," he said.

Mr. Reynolds explained the proposition in some detail, discussing two or three routes that appeared possible. He pointed out that the road also would tap a rich timber area and would be of value to this community from the standpoint of tourists, commercial agriculture and timber. Umalla is willing to build a road from Ukiah to Lehman, he said.

Cochran speaks
The next speaker called on was Attorney George T. Cochran, who emphasized the great value which would result from the completion of the road to Ukiah. He stated that "Congress recently made an appropriation of \$195,000,000 to be appropriated to construct roads over unappropriated lands. Just recently they have started getting these funds appropriated. There is no reason why a part of this fund should not be used for this road over the mountains. There is an estimated stock of 7,000,000,000 feet of timber in these forests, which is sufficient to keep our mills running for fifty years. We can get this timber by making the forests accessible. There is no question but that if we can get accessibility there by a good improved road the managers of the lumber companies here will be encouraged to start operations there. A survey was run over two routes and it was found that to build the road from the western point westward to the construction of a trestle that would cost in the neighborhood of two million dollars. This new road would bring people here from further south, and I believe our commercial club should take up the matter so as to get the project on the highway plan so that funds will be provided for its construction as early as possible."

President George H. Curry read a telegram from Senator Steiwer concerning the designation of a number of Oregon counties, including Union, in the drought area so that farmers could take advantage of loans. He opened the question for discussion and several spoke, all deploring the designation as undesirable publicity and unnecessary. Ernest DeLong stated that he believed it "seems to be somebody's wires are crossed."
