Little Raymond Crow has been brought home from the hospital and is getting along very nicely.

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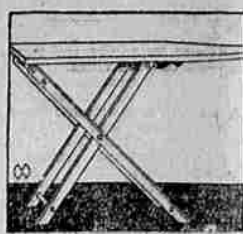
