

Cherry Growers Attend Meet At Cove on Monday

COVE, Ore., (Special)—Between 40 and 45 cherry growers attended the meeting held at the cooperative cherry shed Monday afternoon. R. I. Barker acted as chairman of the meeting. O. T. McWorkey gave a very complete report of statistics given at the state cherry conference at Corvallis. According to the report the

yield of cherries of the Pacific coast will increase in the next few years, owing to the young orchards which are just beginning to bear. Because of the increase in other canned fruits such as pears, peaches and apricots, there is no increasing demand for canned cherries. The supply and demand for canned cherries has been about equal for a number of years and is no export of canned cherries to speak of. The high tariff on cherries at this time is helping the home market to some extent but owing to the fact that tariff changes may occur at any time such help cannot be considered too stable. The demand for black cherries is slightly in excess of the supply, but does

not show a tendency to increase rapidly in the near future, which will tend to leave conditions in the fresh cherry market much as they are for some time. K. J. Stackland told an interesting fact in regard to the Royal Ann or canning cherry market. American manufacturers import millions of pounds of cherries from Italy for the maldesino cherry trade. A firm which imports a great many cherries for this purpose, wrote Mr. Stackland that the reason they did not use home grown cherries was because they could not be sure of enough small cherries to fill their requirements. Mr. Stackland points out that this fact should be of interest to growers in Cove and the

northwest where so many Royal Ann cherries are turned down each year because they are too small for the canning pack. Mr. Stackland exhibited several jars of cherries, three of which had been imported and one of which was a Portland product, showing the difference in size and also the difference in the looks of the hand pitted and stemmed cherries and the machine pitted varieties.

Chores On 1,600-Acre Farm Train Stribling For Schmeling Battle



A "farm-trained" battler will attempt to wrest the world's heavy-weight championship from Max Schmeling next June. Carrying wood for "Ma" and plowing on a 1,600-acre Georgia farm are two of the training chores of W. L. "Young" Stribling, American challenger.

MACON, Ga. (AP)—"Ah reckon," says W. L. Stribling, "that I won't need much extra training for this fight," referring to his world championship bout next June with Max Schmeling.

This does not mean that the Georgia pride is not taking his title chance seriously. But it is the theory of his manager, "Pa," that "Young" Stribling always is in good physical trim and does not need as much training camp routine as the average fighter. Stribling's training camp for the Tuffy Clifts bout was of brief enough duration, but even that left the fighter over-trained, in the opinion of "Pa." Consequently it is not likely that many weeks will be spent in camp knocking sparring partners around the ring.

Wood chopping, plowing, long tramps through the fields and woods on hunting expeditions and other outdoor exercise keep the challenger keen.

The Stribling farm at Oaklocknee consists of 1,600 acres and there are a lot of chores for an able-bodied chap on a farm of that size. Stribling gets his share of them. He has an outdoor ring there where he keeps in practice with the gloves and a tennis court.

The elder Stribling plans a trip to Chicago early in February, when he probably will arrange for a training camp somewhere in the vicinity. Outdoor quarters probably will be chosen.

In about two months the Stribling probably will repair to Warm Springs, Ga., resort founded by Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York. This will be the beginning of the training program.

There will be no sparring partners or that sort of thing just yet. There will be warm baths to melt out the rest of the neuritis, effects of which have annoyed the fighter at different times, swimming and road work.

Suit Is Filed Against Firm Of Rate Engineers

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6 (AP)—Damages of \$100,000 are asked by James W. Carey of the firm of rate engineers of Carey & Harlan, in a suit filed in circuit court here yesterday against U. L. Upson, Harrison A. Whitney and two unidentified defendants. Redress is sought on the grounds the defendants have harmed his reputation and business.

The suit is an outgrowth of the fight being waged here over the proposed employment of Carey & Harlan to make a power survey for the city at a cost of \$25,000.

The complaint alleges that on Jan. 25 Upson, on the stationery of the Uptown Portland Association, Inc., sent to the city council a letter containing a resolution purporting to exonerate the sentiments of the association, in which the plaintiff's reputation as a rate expert was attacked.

The letter, according to the complaint, said "any further employment of the firm in question is both wasteful and extravagant."
