Municipal Band To Give Sacred Concert Sunday

Program of Beautiful and Difficult Numbers Arranged For Recital at M. E. Church.

As the perfect end to a Sabbath day, the municipal band, a civic organization which is nearing perfection, will present a concert of sacred numbers, Sunday evening at eight o'clock at the Methodist church, under the auspices of the ministerial association.

The municipal band under careful and minute direction has attained a precision and tonal quality which makes it rank among the best bands of its kind in the United States. A program of beautiful and difficult numbers has been arranged for the sacred concert Sunday evening and includes a variety of pieces displaying different situations and different moods through the talent and art of the composers.

A soloist who will be a feature of the program is Frank Robinson, a trombonist known throughout the entire Northwest for his beauty of tone and phrasing. He will play the Aria Cujus Animam, from Rossini's "Gianni Schicchi".

Among the numbers to be presented by the band in its entirety are "The Last Chord," by Sullivan; "Largo" from the New World Symphony, by Dvorak; "Pilgrim's Chorus," from Tannhauser, by Wagner; Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata," the overture to "Zampa," by Herold; and "In a Church Yard," by Ketebley.

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New Glassware Reverts to Colonial Styles



New patterns in table glassware reflect styles of colonial days. Here are some pieces in hob-nail design, and both the round foot and square foot styles are finding favor.

PITTSBURGH (AP)—The old is the new in china and glass generally this season.

There is a touch of modernism—squares plates and saucers, and cube-like cups, bowls and teapots—but their use is restricted to the breakfast or informal luncheon.

In all else for general or more formal use—the trend in American glass and china has reverted to the heritage of colonial days, to the corresponding Georgian period of England, and even to the days of Rome and Greece.

These trends were evidenced in the trade show here of the Association of Glass and Pottery Manufacturers, in which new wares are displayed for the approval of buyers from stores from coast to coast.

Most unthinkable is the reversion to the colonial, particularly in glassware there is pure reproduction and modern adaptation—the queer hob-nail pattern of early America against the delicate etching of the modern on shapes of old.

Even color has fallen before the onslaught of "period" that has overcome modernism in furniture and draperies.

A rear-guard of vivid tones holds

fast in such informal pieces as kitchen-ware, breakfast sets and bric-a-brac, but formality, reverting to conservatism in form, reverts also to delicacy in color, to such a degree in some pieces such as gold glass that the tint is little more than a suggestion.

In keeping with hereditary form the gleaming, jewel-like pure crystal, expensive cut or inexpensively pressed, is in prime favor. Newest of the new colors is one of America's oldest, the green created by accident by Baron Stiegel in colonial Pennsylvania.

Rich ruby, in one case secured by the use of gold in the making, has a place with amber in displays of nearly all manufacturers.

Markedly new is the trend to combine color with pure crystal—Stiegel green goblets with crystal stems and bases, crystal with ruby or amber bases.

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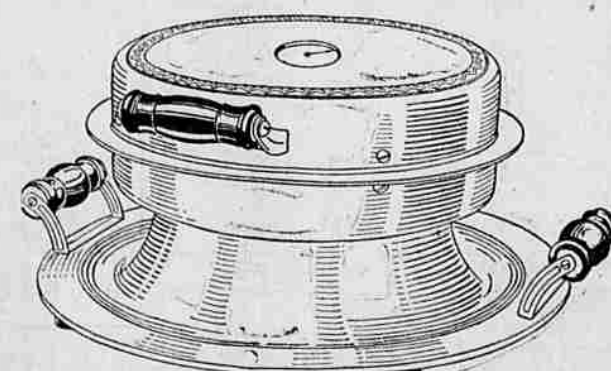
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
