water transportation, particularly Australia.

Cheap Shipments. Australian wheat, Leggo said, was grown around the rim of the continent and could be moved long distances at low cost.

McKelvie said the farm board was keeping a close watch over Russian wheat exports, but "there is nothing we can do about it unless they try to dump it in this country," then, he said, tariff laws could be utilized.

First—Distribution strictly on a basis of population.

Second—Arbitrarily giving each of the 36 counties one representative, the remaining to be apportioned, which, under a tentative plan received by the committee, would give Multnomah county 12; Marion 3; Lane 3 and two each to Clackamas, Jackson, Klamath, Washington, Coos, Elsie, Umatilla, Wasmill, Douglas and one each of the remaining counties on the basis of 7139 inhabitants.

Third—Grant relief to aggregated cases.

Fourth—Nothing.
