WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Feb. 6 (AP) - The Commercial Bulletin of Boston will say tomorrow: "There has been a better demand for wool, especially of the fine and half-blooded order, here during the past week and the market is firmer in line with the improvement noted abroad. Prices in this market are against the buyer, possibly to the extent of a half-cent in the grease, or in exceptional cases possibly a cent, from the low point, on fine and half-blood. Medium wools are firmer but unchanged."

Bank Closed After Run Of Two Days

AURORA, Ore., Feb. 6 (AP) - With a deputy examiner in charge, the state superintendent of banks today was in control of the affairs of the Aurora State bank here, the result of a two-day run on the institution. The board of directors late yesterday adopted a resolution asking the state bank examiner to take over the bank and liquidate its assets for the benefit of depositors.

Eggs Down Two Cents; Butter Is Higher Today

Butter, which has been selling at prices ranging from 30 to 32 cents on the pound raised today and is retailing at 33 to 35 cents. Eggs continue to drop with another two cent drop noted today, from 28 to 26 cents for standards or Uccos, and the others dropping accordingly. Other prices remain steady.

Butter Steady; Egg Market Easy

PORTLAND, Feb. 6 (AP) - Spotted inquiry for butter in the wholesale market today centered particularly on 89 to 91 score cubes. Prices were steady with supply limited. Large shipments were under way to outside markets. Egg market continued easy at unchanged quotations. Receipts were liberal, demand fair and some sales were forced at price concessions. Tillamook County Creamery association quoted Tillamook cheese at a 1c advance today "due to advance in butter markets and small stocks."

Propagating Pineapples Pineapples are propagated by means of crowns, slips, suckers and rattoons. The crown is the leafy part of the fruit just below which small plants form and these are left in the field when the fruit is gathered. These are termed slips. In the arctic of the leaves are buds and those developing near the ground make strong plants and are termed suckers. Buds developing from an underground part are rattoons.

Puffs of Locomotive For every revolution of its driving wheel a locomotive gives forth four separate puffs. These are made by the rapid sending out of waste steam from the smoke stack.
