NEWS OF JOHN LANE'S DEATH REACHES COVE

COVE, Ore. (Special).—The news of the death of John Lane, a former resident of Cove, was received by friends here last night.

Mr. Lane had been in failing health for some years but was critically ill for only three months. He died at the home of his daughter, Sophie L. Allitt in Portland Monday, Jan. 8 at the age of 94 years, and eight months. He was born in the county of Herefordshire, England, April 26, 1836. As a young man he managed the farm for his mother who was widowed when John was about 14 years of age. Later he went away to work in the Black country for a year or two but returned to the farm again. In 1868 he married Sarah Gregg who lived in the same county. Both families had formerly lived in Radnorshire, Wales, and were part Welsh. After his marriage he moved to a town called Leominster where they kept a grocery and feed store for about 13 years but he always thought this a big mistake in his life for he liked farming better than anything else. Two children were born, James Gregg and Sophie. In 1890 the family came to America to join the son, James Gregg who was settled on a homestead north of Elgin in the Leekingsville country. Soon after he came to Oregon he filed papers and later became a citizen of the United States. They moved to Cove in 1898 where they lived in a small acreage and built a home. He was at this time well along in years but his farm was planted to fruit and vegetables and flowers. He was a very serious illness and in 1915 they sold their farm and moved to Portland to be near their daughter. Three years later Mrs. Lane died as the result of a fall. She would have been 89 in July of that year. There are two grandchildren well known to people of Cove, Fred J. Allitt of Purdue university, and Clara Allen, now Mrs. Strong of Seattle, who for many years spent her summers with her grandparents in Cove. There are two other grandchildren, Tom Lane, born in Cove, and Alice Lane, born in Canada. These two spent many years in Australia but are now back in Oregon. Alice teaches in a high school and Tom on a farm. Mr. Lane was a great lover of music and in his youth sang in the village choirs. Mr. and Mrs. Lane were devout Christians, belonging to the Baptist church here. During his residence here he labored diligently for the parcel post and he also worked to create publicity against the indiscriminate use of firearms.

Fruit Salad in Mayonnaise
Date Bread Sandwiches

Fruit Salad in Mayonnaise

Serving 12

2 tablespoons granulated gelatin.

2 tablespoons cold water.

2 cups felling water or fruit juices.

2 tablespoons lemon juice.

1 cup seeded white cherries.

1 cup diced pears.

1 cup diced pineapple.

1 cup red cherries.

1 cup mayonnaise.

1 cup whipped cream.

Four boiling water over gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice. Allow to cool. Mix mayonnaise and whipped cream. Add to gelatin mixture. Add fruits. Pour into individual molds and set in cold place to stiffen. Unmold on lettuce. Top with more whipped cream and mayonnaise.

Date Bread Sandwiches

3 cups Graham flour.

2 teaspoons soda.

1 teaspoon baking powder.

1½ teaspoons salt.

1½ cups sugar.

1½ cups chopped dates.

3 cups milk.

2 tablespoons fat, melted.

2-3 cup white cream cheese.

1½ cups butter.

Mix Graham flour, sugar, soda, baking powder, salt, sugar, dates, milk and fat. Pour into two greased loaf pans. Let rise 15 minutes. Bake one hour in slow oven.

Chocolate Drop Cakes (18)

1½ cup fat.

1½ cup sugar.

3 eggs.

2 squares chocolate, melted.

2 teaspoons vanilla.

1½ teaspoon salt.

1 cup milk (sweet).

3 cups flour.

3 teaspoons baking powder.

Cream fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and beat two minutes. Half fill greased muffin pans, and bake 15 minutes in moderate oven.

Chocolate Frosting

4 tablespoons butter.

1 tablespoon hot coffee.

1½ squares chocolate, cut fine.

1½ teaspoon salt.

1 teaspoon vanilla.

2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar.

1½ cup chopped nuts.

Mix butter, coffee and chocolate. Cook slowly and stir constantly until chocolate has melted. Add salt and sugar. Beat until cool and creamy. Add vanilla. Frost cakes and sprinkle with nuts.

More Medicinal Liquor Ordered By Government

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9 (AP)—Orders for the manufacture of two million gallons of medicinal whiskey in 1931 are being sent to distillers in Pennsylvania and Kentucky by the industrial alcohol bureau of the treasury department.

The action is in compliance with the prohibition law which requires the government to keep an ample stock of medicinal whiskey available. The prohibition bureau last year started to replenish the dwindling supply of legal whiskey which had decreased to approximately 2,500,000 gallons. Manufacture was stopped in 1922.

About 1,500,000 gallons of medicinal liquor are used in the United States each year and the law required it be aged four years before it can be sold.

At present there is approximately 6,000,000 gallons of the old stock of liquor still on hand. There is 2,000,000 of new whiskey manufactured in 1930. The permit for the new manufacture will be issued by the superintending distiller where the whiskey is distilled but where the prohibition bureau here allots the quotas to the various distillers.

The amounts to be made by each are not made public but twenty per cent of the whiskey is Bourbon and is manufactured in Kentucky while 30 per cent is rye and is manufactured in Pennsylvania.

Hardy Discussed At Group Meeting

Thomas Hardy, considered by many critics to be the greatest philosophical writer, was the subject for an interesting address by Professor Russell Blankenship at the luncheon given Saturday by the American Association of University Women at the Sacajawea Inn. The meeting was in charge of the child study group under the leadership of Miss Kate Houz. Hardy's writings were divided into three groups. During his early writings he believed that chance played the greatest part in forming life, the speaker stated, although he was not definitely an exponent of fatalism. "Tess of the D'Urbervilles" shows this first influence. He then believed that nature was paramount in forming life, shown particularly in "The Return of the Native," and lastly, the immiserable will, an indefatigable force, was shown as the guiding spirit of life.

Thomas Hardy was of the people. Prof. Blankenship stated, and liked to inhabit the inns and taverns. His philosophy is that coarseness is life. Prof. Blankenship believes there is evil in the world but all people need not be evil. He can experience vicariously through the fine arts of which Hardy is the greatest exponent.
