UNION, Ore. (Special)—The Union High boys won two basketball games last weekend. After winning from Joseph Friday night they tackled the heavier Wallowa quintet on the Union floor Saturday in a victory which saw the lead reversed at the end of each quarter. Wallowa took a lead in the first period, netting three field goals and one foul and holding Union to one basket, 7 to 2. In the second quarter Union came back with two field goals and four points from fouls, while the visitors failed to score, ending the half in Union's favor, 10 to 7. Again in the third quarter Wallowa outscored the Bobcats, this period ending 15 to Union's 12. A last quarter rally which the visitors strove hard to overcome, gave Union a one-point lead during the last few minutes of play. Final score 21 to 20, Russell McKennon of Allice refereed the game.

The eighth grade boys defeated the freshman team in a preliminary game before the Union-Wallowa contest. While the boys were winning here the Union High girls were defeating the Baker High basketball sextet on their own floor, winning by a score of 8 to 2. Baker made three two points by shooting fouls. Union's two guards, Fredrick Spain and Fredrick Brown, holding the Baker forwards scoreless as far as field goals were concerned. This makes five straight victories for the Union girls. They are striving to win a chicken banquet which has been promised them by the mother of one of the girls if they are undefeated during the season. 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Aviation Study Now Is Offered In 74 Colleges

NEW YORK (AP)—American college students are seeking aviation training faster than the industry can find jobs for them.

A survey by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce reveals that there are 2393 college students studying aviation this year, an increase of nearly one-third over last year's total of 2409.

More than a third of the students, 1419, are enrolled in four-year courses that lead to bachelors' or masters' degrees in aviation.

Enrollments held down

Colleges offering aviation courses also have increased from 61 last year to 74 this year. Fourteen of these have regular four-year aviation courses leading to degrees in aeronautical engineering or air transportation, and graduate courses as well. The figures were gathered for the Aircraft Year Book for 1931.

Many colleges are trying to keep enrollments in their aviation courses to a minimum. It has been found to avoid turning out large numbers of students who will be unable to find jobs after graduation.

And the number of aviation instructors in the colleges is growing with the number of students. The survey shows there are 273 teachers of aviation subjects on college faculties, of whom 63 are on full time, a year ago there were 190, with 40 on full time.

Ground Schools, Too
Along with technical training in aviation, more than a dozen colleges have ground schools to prepare students to learn to handle planes at commercial flying schools.

Several have arrangements with nearby flying schools to test students to fly. There are more than a score of college flying and glider clubs.

Many private commercial schools that taught aviation mechanics, the survey revealed, have ceased to operate because public schools offer the same training. There are 500 elementary, secondary, trade and continuation schools providing aeronautical work of some kind.
