BASIC SCIENCES BILL SENT BACK TO COMMITTEE

SALEM, Feb. 10 (AP)—By a vote of 14 to 12 the senate yesterday voted to refer back to the committee on medicine, pharmacy and dentistry the senate "basic sciences" bill which would require a knowledge of five fundamental sciences by persons practicing under any school of healing...

Under the plan, Multnomah county would lose a member in the house, as would also Marion, Washington, Umatilla and Douglas counties; Clackamas county would lose two. Coos county would receive an additional member, while all the others would remain as under the present system.

Amendments to the public utilities measure opposing the one-man commission plan, removal method proposed, repeal of the certificate of necessity and public convenience feature, and providing in addition a people's advocate separate from the commission, the right of the governor to start investigations, and increase in tenure of office, were forwarded to the committee in a public hearing today by the Portland traffic and transportation association.

Senator William F. Woodard declared the bill was not an effort of the medical doctors to put other schools out of business, "but is an effort to protect the public from some members of the other schools with whom the sick person is in no better hands than he would be in the hands of a garage mechanic not educated beyond the first grade."

Senator L. E. Staples excoriated the medical profession and quoted one as saying "that the bill is not to get at the undesirable in the medical profession, but the undesirable among other schools of healing."

The par-mutual or cooperative method of betting would be permitted at horse races, but that providing that the licensee shall be entitled to deduct 10 per cent. under the provisions of the house bill bearing the names of Representatives Schaupp and Oxman. Thirty per cent of this sum shall be paid to a state racing commission, which is to be established by the board of directors of the licensee to be used for premiums, improvements and necessary expenses of the grounds. Violation of the provisions of the act are misdemeanors and conviction brings a fine of not to exceed \$5000, one year in jail or both.

Racing meets shall be directed by a state racing commission of three members, chosen by the governor upon the importers as proposed in the original draft, but it would allow treasury officers' reports and depositions to be used for evidence in enforcement.

BAR LUMBER FROM SOVIET LOCALITIES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The house ways and means committee today approved a bill to exclude forced labor products.

Chairman Hawley announced the vote was 14 to 8 to report favorably a compromise form of the Kendall bill to put into effect on April 1, under general legislation, the restrictions the tariff law provided to take effect next January.

The revised bill would not place the burden of proof of admissibility upon the importer as proposed in the original draft, but it would allow treasury officers' reports and depositions to be used for evidence in enforcement.

Hawley said the original bill "would have been more effective, but that this was better than none."

cial bond issues, was passed in the senate by a vote of 21 to 9, following a sharp debate. The upper house killed five measures by indefinite postponement, while 17 were approved by vote. Outside the port commission bill, none of the bills were debated, the majority being minor in character.

Bills Introduced—Bills providing for legal horse racing and accompanying betting, making it unnecessary for teachers to make a religious preference statement, and a temporary automobile license charge of 25 cents were introduced in the legislature. Two resolutions, providing for the creation of an interim crime commission of 11 members to investigate crime in the state, and instructing the highway commission to advertise to other states Oregon's scenic roads, were introduced in the house.

One representative from each county, a minimum was decided upon by the new committee on reappointment in the legislature. The committee reached this decision at a long session, but the method in which distribution other than providing one from each county, has not yet been worked out. The arrangement provides for 36 members, leaving but 24 to be divided among the larger counties. Some counties will
