WOOLGROWERS MEET FOR ANNUAL FEST; TRANSACT BUSINESS

With 29 present members and a few guests, the Union County Woolgrowers' association held its annual banquet meeting Saturday evening in the banquet room of the La Grande hotel. The entire meeting was presided over by a spirit of optimism, not particularly that of the industry but that it was in better shape than in such a flourishing condition but that it was in better shape than some of the others and that those present firmly believed that there were better days ahead for sheep growing.

The banquet was spread at six o'clock, and the menu featured lamb chops which the present declared were extra good to eat and also booted their own grating. At the table, in addition to members, were W. J. Peterson, of Baker, associate range examiner, H. A. Lindgren, livestock specialist from the extension service of the state college at Corvallis, and Barnes, field representative of the Pacific Cooperative Woolgrowers' association. These men appeared as guest speakers during the program which followed the banquet, and which was presided over by R. J. Green, of La Grande.

In speaking about his work, Mr. Peterson, of the forest service, stated that the sheep raising area would not be reduced for this coming year and that all the range available would be used during that season. He pointed out the fact that a large part of the sheep raising area was non-tillable land and much of it was used only for grazing purposes.

In his address before the association, Mr. Lindgren gave some interesting figures on the marketing of sheep during the past year and pointed out that there was an increase in the number of ewes being carried over this year. Mr. Lindgren is of the opinion that the sheep industry will come back to better times in the past. He complimented the local men on the marketing system of the past year. Practically all of the lambs were marketed on eastern markets either by the lamb pool or as individuals. The previous year, with the exception of two cars, all were sold at home, according to a custom maintaining during the past ten years.

In giving something of a report of the cooperative wool marketing as conducted through the Pacific Cooperative, Mr. Barnes predicted that a larger quantity of wool would be sold cooperatively during the coming year and he announced to the growers that final settlement for the 1930 crop would be made during the first of this year.

Following the addresses of these three visitors a number of local men took part in the discussion relative to means of reducing costs. S. E. Miller, of Union, president of the county organization, led the discussion. Others who spoke were William Vogel, T. B. Johnson, Forrest Scroggin, H. E. Coolidge, T. J. Scroggin, Hans Selors and H. G. Avery.

As stated before there was a splendid spirit of optimism manifest during the meeting. Although it is difficult to show profit at the present time, sheep owners feel that the industry is in a more secure position than many others. The number of sheep in this county has increased almost 400 per cent in the past ten years. It is thought that this increase will continue, especially in farm flocks. The increase in sheep will make it possible to grow more hay, will return the costs of production of hay and allow some margin which can be marketed. Increases in livestock including dairy cattle, beef cattle and sheep is the only practical means of marketing feed, it was pointed out during the evening.

The matter of a local livestock loan company to be organized for the purpose of securing money from the intermediate credit bank was discussed by H. G. Avery. It is reported that the plan is to be organized and will meet with the County Bankers' association this evening to discuss the plan.

It was also reported that although wool prices have been down during the past year, about \$1.00 was secured in this way. On the other hand sheep to the value of \$1,500 were killed during the year, leaving a deficit of \$400 in the fund, which must be paid out of next year's taxes.

Sheep owners plan to take an active part in the economic conference which opened today at the Sacajawea Inn. On Thursday of this week especially they will take part. S. E. Miller, William Vogel, T. B. Johnson, Lloyd Pierce speaking on the program when local problems will be discussed.

At a brief business session, S. E. Miller was re-elected president, R. J. Green, vice president, William Vogel, Lloyd Pierce and H. G. Avery, board of directors, and H. G. Avery, secretary-treasurer.

IDAHO SENATE PASSES OLD AGE PENSION

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 10 (AP)—The Idaho senate passed the old age pension measure yesterday, 30 to 13. The house sent the direct primary bill on its way to the governor and refused to pass a substitute bill amending the present convention law.

A house joint memorial urging congress to appropriate money for opening the Columbia and Snake rivers to navigation was introduced by the committee on agriculture. It was a new measure made no reference to development of reclamation projects along the Columbia river, a proposal contained in the former memorial. The reclamation provision drew fire from agricultural groups who protested development of new agricultural centers.

Canada Gets New Governor General

LONDON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The Earl of Bessborough yesterday was appointed governor-general of the dominion of Canada, succeeding Lord Willingdon, who is to be viceroy of India.

Vere Brabazon Ponsonby, ninth earl of Bessborough, Baron Ponsonby and Viscount Duncannon, is deputy chairman of De Beers Consolidated Mines, Ltd., chairman of Sao Paulo Railways, Ltd., and was a member of the house of commons for Dover from 1913 to 1920.

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Woodward's Bill Passes Senate; No Opposition

SALEM, Feb. 10 (AP)—No negative argument was made and no negative vote was cast when the senate yesterday passed Senator William F. Woodward's bill to relieve cities of the necessity of applying to the federal power commission for a right of way license on federal land before being permitted authority from the state to appropriate water for power purposes. The bill carries the emergency clause, mainly for the benefit of the city of Salem, which has applications pending on Marion lake and North Santiam river.

At the present time, when the power site is located on federal land, as about 90 per cent of the desirable sites in Oregon are, according to public power development proponents, it is necessary that the application to the federal commission be made within six months after application is made to the state.

As first introduced by Senator Woodward the bill had application only to cities of 300,000 or more population. In other words to the city of Portland. Other members caused an amendment to be made so that it would apply to any city. The bill is considered an administration measure in line with the governor's power program.

The city of Salem made its applications to the state several months ago. The six months within which it is required to apply to the federal power commission will expire in about a month. This was the reason the emergency clause was attached to the bill.

Receiver Appointed For Chicago Paper

CHICAGO, Feb. 10 (AP)—George F. Getz, wealthy business man and sportsman, was appointed receiver for the Chicago Evening Post yesterday and authorized to continue publishing the paper.

John O. Schaffer, publisher of the Post for 30 years, retired Saturday when a receivership petition was filed in superior court.

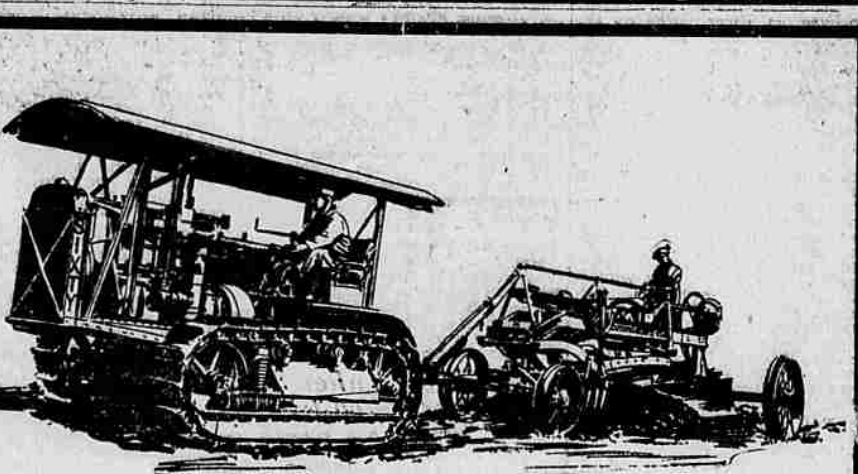
