University Men And Women Will Go North, South

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 11 (Special).—Exotic, semi-tropical Hawaii, rugged scenic Alaska, the University at Eugene, and the Portland extension center will combine to form the campus for the summer sessions of the University of Oregon this year. It is announced by Alfred Powers, director. Luxurious ships will transport students south and north in the Pacific, while an unusual variety of courses will be offered on the campus here and in Portland.

A large number of students from Union county studied at the University of Oregon last summer session including Melvin A. Preher, Imogen Russell and Marie Tiggebeck, of La Grande. E. E. Arant, Stella Mayfield and Mildred Schore, Elgin; Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Coad and Audrey Proctor, Cove; Elmer C. Hansen, Island City; E. O. Bradshaw, of Union, took graduate work last summer.

The Alaskan session, which will be held August 3 to 25, is expected to be one of the most interesting phases of the summer school this year. The actual cruise, which 140 students will make on the S. S. Admiral Rogers, will start from the campus August 12, under the direction of W. G. Best, of the extension division of the university.

Several educators of national fame have already been engaged for the faculty of the Alaskan cruise. It is announced, Dr. Alexander Goldenweiser, noted anthropologist and regarded as the foremost authority on totemism, will offer a course in ethnology; Dr. Joseph Schaefer, author of "History of the Pacific Northwest," will teach Northwest history; Dr. E. L. Packard, professor of geology at the university, will teach geology; and Mable Holmes Parsons, short story writer and professor of

English at the university extension center, will teach literature. Prof. A. R. Sweetser, botanist, will be a member of the cruise for the third time. The cruise will include visits to Ketchikan, with its interesting fisheries; Juneau, the capital of the territory; Skagway, the scene of the historic gold rush of '98, where a side-trip by rail will show the students the Yukon trail; Sitka, capital of the old Russian days, where an entire day will be spent; St. Petersburg, Wrangell, and the famous Metakata school. Special arrangements will be made so that students may see the famous glaciers by daylight, and a side-trip to Mendenhall glacier will be included. The vessel will also stop at Prince Rupert, a port not usually visited.

The Hawaii cruise, which will start June 20 and close August 5, will be directed by Dr. James H. Gilbert, dean of the college of liberal arts and sciences. The Empress of Japan, now the largest and fastest vessel in trans-Pacific service, will take the students to Honolulu and back, and while there they will be quartered in dormitories.

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Income Tax Facts

No. 9
All net income up to \$5,000, whether actually earned or not, is considered "earned income" for the purpose of the 25 per cent credit. However, thousands of returns are received showing net income in excess of \$5,000, part of which was earned income and part of which was not earned. Following is an example of how to compute correctly the tax on such a return.

A taxpayer, married and with no dependents, received in 1930 a salary of \$4,000 and from a real estate transaction made a net profit of \$1,000. His personal exemption is \$3,500. The tax rate is 1 1/2 per cent on the first \$4,000 in excess of such exemption, and 3 per cent on the remainder:

Net income \$5,000
Less personal exemption 3,500
Balance, taxable income 1,500

1 1/2 per cent on first \$4,000 60
3 per cent on the remaining \$500 15
Total tax 75

But of the \$5,000 net income, \$5,000 is considered as earned net income. From \$5,000, therefore, is deducted the personal exemption of \$3,500, the tax on the remaining \$1,500 is 1 1/2 per cent amounting to \$22.50. Deduct one-fourth of \$22.50, or \$5.63, from \$75, leaving payable a tax of \$69.37.
