Nellie R. Grace 87 Years of Age On Wednesday

After the next fire that raged the town and the books were swept away in the flames, it was at her suggestion that everyone give as many books as they could spare to begin anew to build a library. As the years went on it was a proud moment for her when a new fireproof building stood in the place of the frame structure that had been reduced to ashes.

Mrs. Grace is still at her post, the love she loves the well-filled shelves although she longs for new books and strives to give it the air of a city library with its atmosphere of quiet and culture.

Mrs. Grace was born in Kentucky, Feb. 11, 1844, lived in St. Louis, Mo., from 1860 to 1870, spent some years in the profession of teaching, was newspaper editor and publisher for 41 years. She was married to David L. Grace June 15, 1879 and he passed away 21 years later on the anniversary of their wedding day. She has been librarian of the Cove library for 14 years.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 12 (AP)—"The Flea," so called by President Abraham Lincoln because of his ability to move quickly as a spy for the Union forces during the Civil war, still lives.

He is Jason H. Egerly, 92-year-old resident of Blue Island, Ill., whose story of anecdotes of the Emancipator was added to the long list recounted each year in connection with the anniversary of Lincoln's birth. Today marks the one hundred and twenty-second anniversary.

It was after he had stolen the Wilcox Creek battle plans "from under the nose of Robert E. Lee," Egerly said, that Lincoln gave him the nickname of "The Flea." Secretary of State Seward had doubted the authenticity of Lee's signature on the plan, so Lincoln called Egerly in for a conference.

"Did you ever try to put your finger on a flea?" Lincoln is quoted as asking Seward—"to find he wasn't there. That's the way with my man. He got these plans and immediately wasn't there."

Lincoln Curious, He Said When Confederate General Early started his four-day attack on the city of Washington, Egerly escorted Lincoln in an examination of defenses. Lincoln was curious, he said. He stood boldly on the fortifications looking out toward the Confederate lines. Cannon shots fell near him.

"Get down from there Mr. Lincoln," Egerly said he advised. "They have our range. Get down and let me watch."

"Lincoln said something about my life being as sweet to me as his to him, but right then a minnie ball hit between his feet."

"Get down, Mr. Lincoln," Egerly said he yelled and reached up to help the president.

"All right," Lincoln is quoted as answering, "I will."

Discovery of the part that Egerly played in Lincoln's career and the finding of documentary evidence that Lincoln once served on the circuit court bench in Springfield as an acting judge, were the only new stories of Lincoln's life that have been brought to light during the past year, local historians say.

Since Lincoln's death 65 years ago some 2,000,000 persons have journeyed to Springfield, where he is buried, to pay tribute to his memory.

Butter Market Reflects Easy Tone at Opening

PORTLAND, Feb. 12 (AP)—Wholesale butter market reflected an easy tone at opening today as supplies appeared more liberal and dealers were free sellers at prices ranging down to below quotations which officially were unchanged while retailers were inclined to limit purchases to immediate requirements.

Although increased consumption of eggs was noticeable at current low prices, the egg market opened easy with liberal supplies and trading fairly active.

Most lines of fresh fruits and vegetables opened at steady prices. Potatoes, however, a noticeable weak spot due to large dealer holdings and light demand, were quoted 10 cents a cwt. lower at from \$1.00 to \$1.50 for U. S. No. 1 stock. Government market news service reported.

Cheap ungraded apples continue in fair demand at Portland, but wrapped and packed stock is moving very slowly here. Foreign demand shows improvement, due to complete depletion of European-grown apples. It is expected that this improvement in foreign demand will result in continued steady prices and movement in the Northwest. Small to medium sized Westerners, suitable for export, are displaying a firmer tone now.

Fancy Delicious are moving more readily than extra fancy, due largely to the price differential.
