respectively, asserts that "as a church we take no stand either for or against prohibition, although we hold that the laws of the state are to be obeyed by all."

"As citizens and as church we cherish very highly the great American principle of the separation of church and state."

"We regard the agitation for prohibition laws on the part of the church bodies as a deplorable departure from this principle."

Oppose Police Bill—Opposition to various phases of the state police bill, chief among which was the inclusion of the traffic department into the constabulary system, was voiced at the hearing before the senate revision of laws committee last night.

The measure as introduced by Senator B. L. Eddy was drafted by Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist and George Joseph, and carries with it the endorsement of Governor Julius L. Meier.

Secretary of State Hal E. Ross appeared before the committee protesting, as he had done by letter to the governor previously, the plan to transfer the traffic law enforcement from his department to the police system, and filed a long brief with the committee setting forth his objections.

Others appearing included representatives of the Oregon State Motor association, state labor organization, Portland Labor council, the W. C. T. U. and members of the game and fish commissions.

Two individuals, representing taxpayers urged adoption of the measure, while Sam Koser, former secretary of state, suggested cooperation with his department and the history of the highway patrol in Oregon.

HOME MADE CANCEL MARK STARTS POSTOFFICE RUSH

FORT MYERS, Fla. (AP)—A home-made rubber cancellation stamp used for the last year at the local postoffice has been ordered discarded by the postmaster general.

When the postoffice lost its regular cancellation stamp for registered and insured mail, C. J. Robinson, postoffice employee, cut one from a blank stamp. The homemade stamp was in the form of a rosette with ten petals.

Stamps cancelled by the device quickly came into demand by stamp collectors. Hundreds of letters were received during the year for special cancellation.

COURT TO CALL QUEEN BEE TO TESTIFY IN THEFT TRIAL

WATERLOO, Ia. (AP)—Courts here must decide whether a certain lady bee now in custody of the law is an apian aristocrat from the Caucasus mountains, or just a common bee.

The bee, claims Dr. H. E. Harvey, is one of his imported swarms. Its brothers and sisters were all burned to death in their hive recently. This can escape by hiding in a comb of honey which was stolen a short time later.

When officers searched the home of Leslie W. Ferguson they found a cache of honey, and this one bee. Ferguson faces a larceny charge and the principal witness will be the bee, whose characteristics, Dr. Harvey claims, make it easily distinguishable from American bees.

POPE'S VOICE HEARD OVER WORLD TODAY

holiness the work entrusted to me. Be pleased, I pray you, to let your voice be heard across the world."

The pope spoke in a clear voice, without hesitation.

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He threw all his vigorous personality into the talk and the half dozen privileged persons with him in the little room saw him lift his right arm occasionally and bring his hand down sharply on his right knee to emphasize his words.

"He spoke in Latin but he seemed eager to press home his points even to those listeners who did not understand the ancient tongue."

"Let the first word," the pope said, "be to the glory of God in the highest and on earth peace, good will to men."

He addressed his message to all his congregation throughout the world, to the princes of the church, to the missionaries, and prelates abroad, adjuring them to continue in their work of propagating the faith of the church.

"Be ye diligent," he urged them, "persevere in your apostolic labors."

"Speaks to Rulers of World" To the rulers of the world he addressed the reminder that all power is from God, upon their subjects he adjured obedience.

The message concluded: "To the rulers of the world we say that all power is from God. Subjects, be ye obedient. Who resists power resists God and brings eternal damnation on himself."

"To the rich we say: You are the ministers of divine providence; let your goods be dispensed to the poor. Remember the words of Christ—'woe to you rich.'"

"Poor people, remember the words of Christ, the example of Christ. 'It remains now at the end that to the whole world and to all its inhabitants we give our apostolic benediction.'"

"Workers and employers, work together in fraternal charity, seeking always what is just."

"Last in execution, but first in intention, we remember those who are afflicted with infirmities and sufferings, offering our prayers and our help, and remembering the words of him whose person we represent: 'Come unto me all ye who labor and are heavy laden and I will refresh you.'"

NEW DEVICE FIGHTS FOG
WASHINGTON (AP)—The federal lighthouse service has devised a new method of sending out fog warning signals which permits fog-bound vessels to determine their distance from lighthouses or lightships.

The canal would be 172 miles long, require ten years of more to build and cost about \$700,000,000, army engineers say. The locks probably would be 1,200 feet long by 125 feet wide to accommodate the larger ships built since the Panama canal was opened. The locks at Panama are 1,000 feet by 110.
