LAST PREHISTORIC BEASTS SEEN BY EARLY AMERICANS

PASADENA, Cal. (AP)—Perhaps prehistoric beasts roamed the Rockies not so long ago.

Their skeletons, found in Gypsum cave, Nevada, along with evidences of human beings who wore their temperatures, has revealed this possibility.

Either these early American men lived a very long time ago, says Dr. Chester Stock of California Institute of Technology, or else the animals did not die out in such remote antiquity as generally believed.

The Gypsum cave deposits, Dr. Stock says, may answer this question. With the skeletons are dried fragments of cacti, and comparison of these remains with the known history of plant evolution may provide a clue to the time when the cacti grew.

Egg Barrage Greet's Thompson's Speech

CHICAGO, Feb. 14 (AP)—A barrage of eggs thrown at Mayor William Hale Thompson as he delivered a campaign speech in a downtown theatre broke up the meeting temporarily and started a near riot. Police rescued the mayor and rushed him out of the theatre after other members of the audience had begun to assault him.

Mayor Thompson, campaigning for re-nomination on the Republican ticket, was wearing a leather halter and saying "I wear no man's halter around my neck" when a man in the audience shouted, "Oh, yes you do - you wear the hoodlums' halter," and let fly several eggs.

As his neighbors pounced on the egg thrower, several policemen escorted him out a stage door. None of the eggs hit the mayor, although one splattered against the microphone.

NEW RAILWAY WILL Tap Timber Lands

ST. PAUL, Feb. 13 (AP)—Officials of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific railways yesterday announced the roads had received permission from the interstate commerce commission to construct a \$1,500,000 extension into valuable timber lands of Oregon.

Six billion feet of timber, they said, will be tapped by the new line which will be a subsidiary of both roads. The extension will consist of about 35 miles of new trackage west of Eugene, Ore., to be built by the Oregon Electric railway. It will enter the virgin timber regions of the Siuslaw valley.
