BRITAIN PLOTS CAMPAIGN

AGAINST CATTLE PARASITE

LONDON (AP)—A kingdom-wide campaign against the warble fly, which costs cattle farmers \$5,000,000 yearly, is being mapped in England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland.

The fly is a parasite living on the bodies of cattle. Its grubs bore into the hide, making holes that smell of tanning. As many as 1,000 holes have been found in one hide.

Now, however, simple and inexpensive dip, built on extract of fern, an eastern plant, has been found effective against it.

IOWA FARM INCOMES TUMBLE

AMES, Iowa (AP)—Iowa's 10 principal farm commodities—hogs, cattle, sheep, corn, oats, wheat, barley, dairy products and eggs and poultry—showed a drop of \$100,000,000 in 1930 income, in comparison with 1929.

NORTHWEST WHEAT AREA

INVADIED BY PEA GROWERS

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—Pea growers adhering to the formula of supply and demand, have invaded the Palouse wheat region to merchandise their product.

The probable demand is estimated before decisions on planting and contracts are made.

In the 1930 season 75 per cent of 70,000 acres planted in the Palouse region was on a contract basis. An average crop of 20 bushels to the acre was produced at a return of \$24 an acre.

This was comparable to a yield of 65-60 per acre for 20 bushels of wheat in midyear. Wheat men have begun to rotate with peas as a fertilizing crop after the land has been planted to wheat for two or three years. Most of the peas, however, come from farms strictly devoted to the vegetable.

FARMERS' SONS SURPASS

SIBES IN RAISING CORN

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Sons of Cherokee county, Texas, farmers had better fortune with corn production in 1930 than did the farmers themselves.

The summary of W. L. Knapp, county farm agent, revealed that the boys, members of farm clubs, harvested an average of 61 bushels an acre, as against 29 bushels for the adult growers.

Income Tax Facts

NO. 13

Of the million of income-tax returns that are filed annually the vast majority are from persons whose income consists of "compensation for personal services actually rendered." All of the various types of compensation, unless such income is specifically exempt by statute, should be included in the tax-payer's return of gross income, such as salaries, wages, fees, commissions, bonuses, tips, honorariums, prizes, awards, pensions in recognition of past services, etc. In general, compensation for personal services should be reported for taxation purposes in the year it is received or unqualifiedly made subject to demand. If the services were rendered during the year 1929, or even prior thereto, but the compensation was not received until 1930, the entire amount is taxable in the year received when the taxpayer is reporting on the cash receipts basis. Most individuals use the cash receipts basis in reporting net income.

The salaries of federal officers and employees are subject to the income tax, except the salary of the president of the United States and federal judges. Other items subject to taxation are salaries and fees received by ministers of the gospel for funerals, marriages, baptisms, masses and like services; executors' fees; directors' fees; federal jury fees; base pay of United States army and navy officers on duty in the United States; and prizes received in contests of various kinds.

The compensation received by employees from organizations which are themselves exempt from taxation are taxable, as, for example, the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., charitable and religious organizations, boards of trade, chambers of commerce, and trade relief organizations, organized and operated for purposes other than financial gain.

China's Round-Up Clearing Country Of Red Brigands

HANKOW (AP)—The great bandit round-up in China is in full swing with Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek, head of the nationalist government, as general foehead of the drive.

And the general is getting much better results than his many critics thought he would when he started, early in the winter, on his campaign to stamp out brigandage and communism in old China.

General Chiang gave himself and his subordinate commanders three months in which to complete the job. Whether he will exterminate bandits and communists in that space of time is a matter for the scotchman, but in any event he has made progress.

Harlow Jones, men, able for the first time in a year to send goods into the interior without the fear of having them seized by marauders maintain that what Chiang has already accomplished has justified his campaign.

More real progress has been made in Hunan than in the other four provinces of Fukien, Kiangsi, Honan and Hubei.

In some sections of Hunan, over-ridden by communists and bandits for two years, not a red flag is to be found and village folk are returning to their homes from Hankow and other cities where they took refuge.

There also is a noticeable improvement in commerce on the Yangtze river.

The government's capture of Hukou, Chaling, near the eastern border of Hunan, was a body blow to Gen. Ho Lung and his red army. His original force of 12,000 has been cut in half and the remnants, say military reports, have split into small bands.
