Chocolate Macaroon Dessert Coffee

- Vegetable Gelatin Salad
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture.
2 cups boiling water.
1 teaspoon salt.
4 tablespoons vinegar.
2 tablespoons sugar.
2 tablespoons chopped pimentos.
1 cup chopped cabbage.
1/2 cup cooked peas.
2 tablespoons chopped onions.
2 tablespoons chopped sweet pickles.
2 tablespoons chopped pimentos.
Four boiling water over gelatin mixture and stir until dissolved. Add salt, vinegar and sugar. Mix and cool. Add rest of ingredients and pour into shallow pan rinsed out with cold water. Set in cold place to stiffen. Cut in squares. Serve on lettuce. Add olive dressing.

- Olive Dressing
1 teaspoon salt.
2 teaspoons sugar.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1/4 teaspoon mustard.
5 tablespoons vinegar.
2-3 cup salad oil.
1-3 cup chopped green olives.
2 tablespoons catsup.
2 tablespoons chili sauce.
Mix ingredients. Beat with fork. Chill. Mix well. Serve on vegetable or lettuce salads.

- Chocolate Macaroon Dessert
1 1/2 cups flour.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
2 teaspoons baking powder.
1/2 cup sugar.
1 egg.
1/2 cup milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
4 tablespoons fat, melted.
Mix all ingredients and beat two minutes. Pour into shallow pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cool and cover with chocolate mixture.

- Chocolate Mixture
1/2 cup sugar.
4 tablespoons flour.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1/2 cup chocolate, cut fine.
1 cup milk.
1 egg yolk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1 cup crushed macaroons (almond cocoanut).
Blend sugar, flour and salt. Add chocolate and milk. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Add egg yolk. Cook one minute. Add vanilla. Beat well and cool. Pour over top of baked cake and sprinkle with macaroons. Serve cut in bars.

NEW ORLEANS LAYS \$62,000,000 STAKE ON FUTURE OF PORT
NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—New Orleans has started work on a \$62,000,000 program of port improvements in preparation for the return of the good old days of heavy traffic on the Mississippi.

The city foresees the dawn of a new prosperity in announcement that the last link of a through-channel from Chicago to New Orleans will be completed by the summer of 1933.

Officials of the Mississippi Valley association predict that completion of this link will result in the movement of 200,000,000 tons yearly of water-borne freight, as a lion's share of this commerce will probably originate in or be destined to this port.

New Orleans is preparing for it by spending \$5,000,000 for ten new public wharves; \$25,500,000 for new rail terminals and bridges; \$15,000,000 for steamships; \$11,500,000 for waterways and barge line improvements; and \$4,000,000 on other miscellaneous port facilities.

Discover Lands In The Antarctic

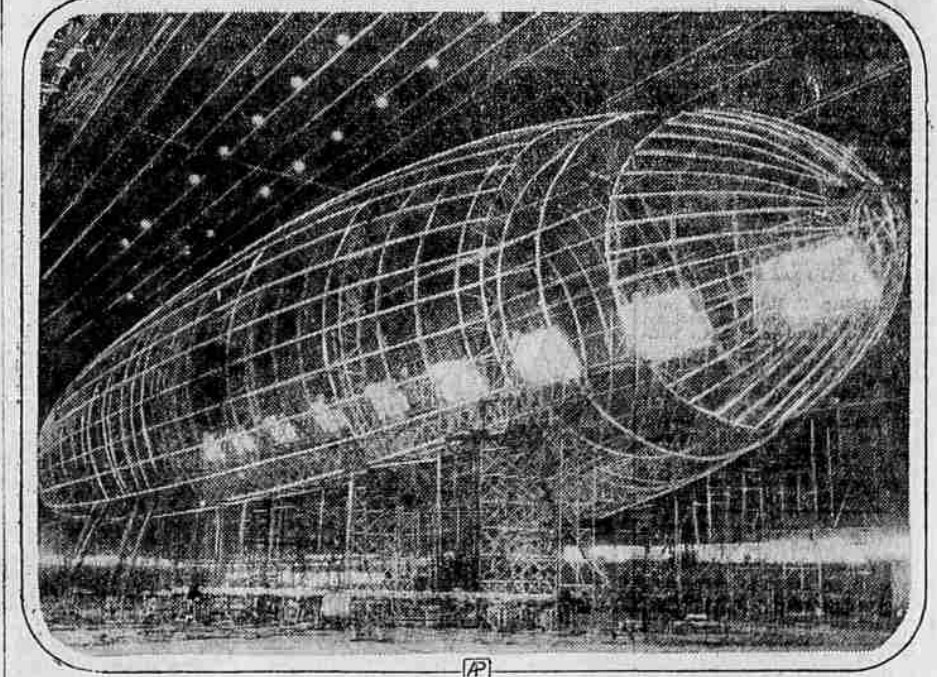
OSLO, Norway, Feb. 16 (AP)—New land has been discovered in the antarctic by the Norwegian whaler Tork, which has been operating in conjunction with a Norwegian antarctic expedition, the whaler reported in a wireless message today.
The new land, the message said, is a continuation of McRobertson Land, which Sir Douglas Mawson discovered last year, and lies between latitude 83 degrees, 50 minutes south, longitude 71 degrees east and latitude 68 degrees 10 minutes south and longitude 65 degrees east.

New Navy Dirigible, Dwarfing Graf Zeppelin, 'Dressed' By 800 Men For First Flight In June



The metal skeleton of the first of the two new super-dirigibles being built for the United States navy is now being covered with fabric, in preparation for test flights in June. The new dirigible has a gas volume nearly twice that of the Graf Zeppelin.

AKRON, O. (AP)—A monster skeleton of metal girders is getting "dressed up" to go places as the world's largest and fastest airship.
Near midsummer it is scheduled to "join the navy and see the world" as the first of two super-dirigibles to reign as queens of the skies.
Eight hundred workmen at the Goodyear-Zeppelin dock, half of them making parts and the others putting them in place, are breathing life into the inert mass of fabric and metal.
A major bit of work now begun is clothing the skeleton lattice-work with a cotton dress, a covering fashioned from fabric panels nearly eight feet square.
Aluminum Over All
The squares are being laced on. Where the sections come together, narrow tape will be gummed on to make the entire covering smooth.

Over all will go coatings of "dope" and aluminum powder.
These will shrink the fabric tightly against the framework, making a smooth surface to lessen wind resistance and reflect the sun's rays that might deteriorate the covering and cause the interior lifting gases to expand.
The dirigible will be the first in history with gas cells not fashioned from gold-beaters' skin. Of the twelve huge cells which will house the lifting gas, half are of rubberized fabric and half of a gelatin latex developed by Goodyear scientists.
Motor Cars in Ship
These cells are being fashioned in the balloon room at the dock. Ten will be installed between the main ring girders, which stand 74 feet apart. One will fit between the front ring and the nose of the ship, while a cone-shaped cell will go in the tapering tail.

Motor cars are being built in the ship, and the eight engines, now being tested, later will be fitted in place. The framework is complete except for the tail surfaces by which the ship will be controlled. They will be hoisted in place when complete.
In dressing the skeleton a T-shaped opening will be left under a storage compartment, which will hold five completely assembled airplanes. The compartment will be fitted with collapsible doors, through which the planes can be lowered for flight or hoisted for interior storage.
The dirigible, named the Akron, is scheduled to be completed near the middle of June. It will have a gas volume of 6,500,000 cubic feet, nearly twice that of the Graf Zeppelin.
The builders expect that nearly a month will be spent in preliminary flights before the ship will be turned over to the navy for approval.
