Eberhard's Quick Action Prevents Wielding Cleaver

SALEM, Feb. 17 (AP)—A tax of 25 cents a gallon on liquid malt and five cents a pound on dry malt is proposed in a measure which the ways and means committee will introduce in the legislature as a group bill. The proposal is fathered by Senator B. W. Johnson and it is estimated it will bring \$100,000. The bill creating a state department of agriculture will also be reported out without recommendation. These actions were decided upon at the session of the ways and means committee last night. Had it not been for quick action by Senator Colon R. Eberhard, of Union county, the committee probably would have wielded the cleaver on the requested appropriation of the state engineering department by cutting \$14,591 from the desired \$82,321 and reducing it to the figure appropriated two years ago. As it was the committee slashed \$5,000 from the salary item, reducing that to \$58,880 and the total amount to \$77,321. A move had been made to allow the same amount as two years ago when Eberhard informed the committee that, because of the governor's new power program, the state engineer was going to be the most active official in the state during the next four years. "If you vote in the senate today on the hydro-electric commission bill," said Eberhard, "you are making the engineer a member of what is going to be the most powerful commission in the state. It would be a great mistake to cut that appropriation at this time."

Some explanation from State Budget Director Sam A. Kozar was necessary to save the state reclamation commission which asked for \$18,000. Senator W. E. Burke was for disallowing the entire amount, declaring that the commission had to do with irrigation and "irrigation isn't being done any more." Kozar explained that the commission gave its attention largely to the reorganizing and refinancing of distressed districts under the rehabilitation act of 1927. On motion by Senator W. F. Woodward the appropriation was cut to \$15,000.

Denies Embezzlement—NEW YORK, Feb. 17 (AP)—Adolph F. Linden, former Seattle, Wash., banker, who is accused of embezzling \$250,000 from the Puget Sound Savings and Loan company, of which he was president, will return to Seattle to explain matters if his former associates will advance his fare.

Mr. Linden made this statement to Assistant Chief Inspector John J. Sullivan when he appeared in the lineup at police headquarters this morning. He is charged with being a fugitive from justice. Linden denied all knowledge of the embezzlement.

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Colonial Areas To Be Saved As National Shrine

WASHINGTON (AP)—Historic centers in Virginia, bearing the battle scars of the birth of a nation, will be preserved by the government. Rich in the lore of colonial and revolutionary valor, three of Virginia's shrines have been proclaimed a national monument by President Hoover to guard their wealth.

The Colonial National Monument, as the area is to be known, lies within the few miles between Jamestown Island, the first settlement, and the Yorktown battlefield, where Cornwallis surrendered.

Centered around Williamsburg, Williamsburg, the old capital of colonial Virginia, where John D. Rockefeller has spent hundreds of thousands in restoring the pre-revolutionary buildings, is the center of the memorial.

A wide, smooth highway will link the island with Williamsburg, and Williamsburg with Yorktown. Across the York river from Yorktown is Gloucester Point, made part of the monument.

The southern half of Jamestown Island is the beginning of the monument. The heart of Williamsburg, in which are grouped the old buildings, and the eastern half of Yorktown, with the surrounding battlefield area, form the rest.

Director Horace M. Albright of the national park service, in charge of the project, says he expects to expedite all work through cooperation with Virginia state groups. Virginia plans to signalize the memorial proclamation in Yorktown next October. The park service is joining in plans for this event.

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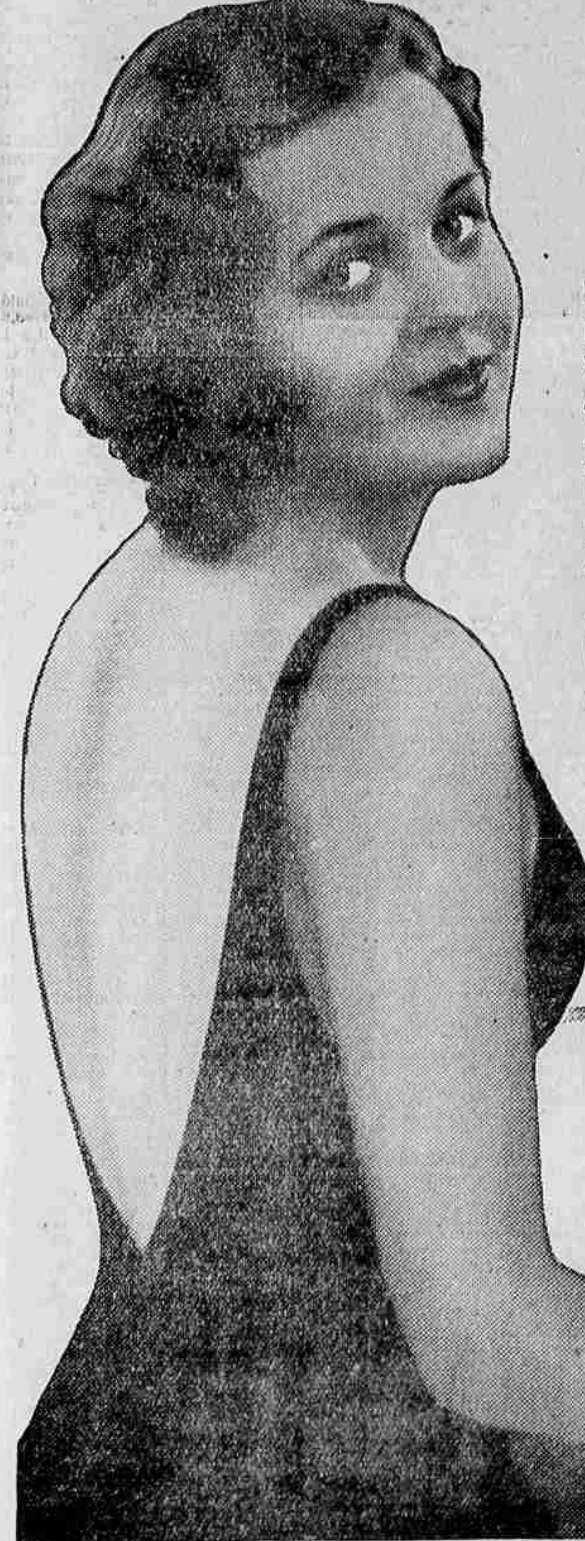
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
