The weather was perfect, bright and warm, and the streets were swarming with visitors throughout the day.

The pet parade proved to be one of the best features of the day with nearly every conceivable type of tame animal entered. Prizes were awarded for the eight different classes of entries with Clint Haynes, chief of police; Fred Henning, and Mrs. Elmo Stevenson acting as judges.

For the best performing pet Francis McClure, 802 C avenue, who was No. 18 in the parade, won the first prize with his goat and wagon. Willard Hall, who lives at 1301 Butler street, won second with his goat and wagon outfit; while Del Kennedy, No. 58, 1405 Sixth street, received third prize with his pet goat.

Dogs proved to be the best actors with three of these pets winning the prizes offered for the best trained pet entered in the parade. Maxine Turnbull, No. 118, 1000 C avenue, received first prize; Adriaan Moss, No. 70, of Allice, second; Virginia Hardeman, No. 126, 507 Adams, third.

The Williamson bill to ban all Russian products. Hawley declined to make public the vote in the committee. The resolution adopted read:

"Whereas, in the opinion of the committee there would not be sufficient time during the remainder of the present session for the consideration of tariff or embargo bills, therefore be it resolved that the consideration of all such bills be referred to and pending before the committee be postponed." The committee does not expect to meet again this session.

The postponement resolution was adopted 13 to 7. Before it was adopted, Democratic Leader Garner moved that all legislation for a protection tariff be excepted but was defeated, 13 to 7. Representative Ramseyer, Republican, Iowa, then asked that the Burton bill for a temporary embargo on depressed agricultural products be passed by the committee be excepted. This was rejected 17 to 3.

There was no direct vote on the Capper-Garber oil imports restriction bill.

MEIER SIGNS THE PUBLIC UTILITY BILL

Senate Bill 32, one of the famous bills of the session, providing that self-sustaining departments be budgeted as other departments and that their expenditures be appropriated by the legislature, also got adverse action from the committee. It was first in the judiciary committee which held a public hearing on the measure.

Other bills on which the committee voted to report adversely were: Bill providing for a code reviser and appropriating \$500, sponsored by the state bar association; the Upton bill appropriating \$7500 annually for elimination of grapefruit in Klamath and Lake counties; appropriation of \$100,000 to match federal money.

Building Code Withdrawn
The state building code and creation of welfare committees were withdrawn from consideration, while many others were indefinitely postponed. The latter class includes the medical science bill, prohibition referendum, creation of tax supervising bodies, the limiting of advertising signs on highways, repeal of the student transportation provisions, refund of market road tax money to counties and others of controversial nature.

Considered half through the legislature by passage in one of the houses are the three major power bills, the tunnel commission, curbing activities of the emergency board, old age pension interim study, oleomargarine bills, the department of agriculture, state banking code, the barber code, marriage regulations, allowing five days between securing license and wedding, the kiddie market road tax repeal, commercial fish code, the uniform traffic law, and the state's Malheur county's name to Simnott county.

Status of Armies
Committees are still considering or have just reported on for floor action the important state constitutional measure, regulation of narcotics sales, chain licenses, excise and industrial tax bills, and 22 senate bills. There are 21 house bills ready for his sanction and 29 senate bills.
