Menus Of The Day

By Mrs. Alexander George (From Sunday's Dinner) Browned Meat Cakes Sweet Potatoes Virginia Buttered Cabbage Bread Butter Celery and Apple Salad Peach Custard Dessert Coffee

Browned Meat Cakes (Serving 6) 2 cups chopped, cooked meat. 1 cup mashed potatoes. 2 tablespoons finely chopped onions. 2 tablespoons chopped celery. 1/4 teaspoon salt. 1/4 teaspoon paprika. 1-3 cup flour. 4 tablespoon fat. 1/2 cup gravy. Mix meat, potatoes, onions, celery, salt and paprika. Shape into cakes 2-3 inch thick and 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Roll in flour. Heat fat and add and brown meat cakes. Add gravy. Cover and cook two minutes.

Sweet Potatoes Virginia 4 cooked sweet potatoes. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/4 teaspoon paprika. 1 egg. 1 tablespoon cold water. 1 cup cracker crumbs. 2 tablespoons fat. Mix seasonings, egg and water. Beat with fork. Dip potatoes, cut in strips, in this mixture. Roll each strip in crumbs. Heat fat and add brown potatoes.

Celery and Apple Salad 1 cup diced apples. 2 tablespoons lemon juice. 1 cup diced celery. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 2-3 cup diced marshmallows. 1/2 cup salad dressing. 1/2 cup broken nuts. Chill ingredients. Combine and serve at once. This salad can be served on lettuce, cabbage or other greens.

Peach Custard Dessert 1/2 cup sugar. 2 tablespoons flour. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 3 egg yolks. 2 cups milk.

1/2 cup peach juice. 2 tablespoons butter. 1 cup diced canned peaches. 1 teaspoon vanilla. 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract. 1/4 teaspoon almond extract. 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten. Blend sugar, flour and salt. Add peaches, milk and peach juice. Cook in double boiler. Stir frequently. Add pecans, butter, extract when mixed. Fold in egg whites. Pour into glass dish and chill.

Confirm Federal Reserve Governor

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP) — The senate yesterday confirmed the nomination of Eugene Meyer, of New York, to be governor of the federal reserve board.

The vote was 72 to 11. The action climaxed a lengthy controversy over the nomination which has been pending since early December. The New Yorker has been serving under recess appointment since last September.

The appointment reached the floor more than a month ago but was sent back to committee at the request of Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, for an inquiry into charges by Representative McPadden, Republican, Pennsylvania, that Meyer obtained the nomination by virtue of Wall Street influence. Meyer denied the charges and was upheld by the investigating sub-committee and the entire banking committee.

OFFICERS SEARCH FOR BANDIT TRIO IN MIDDLE WEST

and said his home was at Hastings. The woman and child were taken to the county jail at Hebron.

Condit, an investigator for the Nebraska Bankers' association, was shot by one of the robbers when officers attempted to arrest the bandits who yesterday robbed the Hastings National bank of \$27,573 after blinding and gagging thirteen employees of the bank.

Late last night officers surrounded the robbers' house two blocks from Hastings college. Two officers went to the door. The robbers kept guns trained on them while they were in the house and the officers were forced to leave. Condit attempted to enter the house through a rear door and was shot. He returned the fire, and the robbers dragged him into the house.

Gun Fight Follows

A gun fight between officers and the robbers followed and numerous shots were exchanged. Pointing two machine guns at Condit, the robbers forced him to walk to the front of the house and plead with the other officers to cease firing. The officers put down their guns and were forced to lay on the ground while the bandits escaped in two motorcars with the woman and child. Two officers, Police Captain Frank Yettman and Patrolman William Woods, were kidnapped by the bandits and taken with them.

Woods was found early this morning bound to a fence post four miles west of Grafton, Neb. He was forced to enter the robbers' car driven by Hendricks.

When they reached the point near Grafton, the man ordered woods out of the car, bound his hands, forced him to sit down straddle a fence post and then bound his feet with barb wire. The robber stuffed his handkerchief in the officers' mouth before abandoning him. Several hours later Hendricks told officers at Hebron where he had left the police man and a posse quickly went to his aid.

Woods said the two autos used by the robbers in their escape separated before leaving Hastings and that he had no idea which road the other car, carrying three robbers and Police Captain Frank Yettman, who also was kidnapped, took.
