Winter Much In Evidence In The Wallowa Country

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special) — Severely freezing at night reminds residents of this section that winter is still much in evidence. The weather during the greater part of the past week has been quite clear and free from storms and warm sunshine during the day has made the temperature quite pleasant, however the nights have been exceptionally cold. Nearly all of the forenoon sun is required to thaw the frozen ground enough for water to commence running and a hard crust on the snow makes the going quite slow. Wheat farmers say they are glad to see the grain fields remain snow covered so long as hard freezing is going on. The grain is uncovered in a few small patches on some of the fields and gives appearance of being in good shape. While freezing has been rather severe during the greater part of the winter, many express the opinion that there was little chance for danger to the grain from heaving of the surface of the ground, because of the fact that at the start of winter the ground was exceptionally dry, with the exception of a few inches on top which was moistened by the late fall rains. This is thought to have also been the cause of such a marked water shortage with many of the wells and springs in nearly all parts of the community.
Road conditions are not at their worst here yet. In only a few places has the frost left the road beds sufficiently to allow vehicles to break

through and with the ground not being wet to any depth to speak of, many say they do not look for much bad roads and deep mud unless there should be a large amount of storm after the frost has left the soil.
Farming interests fear that the lack of stored moisture may prove a serious thing in crop and pasture growth unless there is much spring and early summer rains. Practically the same amount of feed is required at most of the farms as has been done during the past three months. In a few instances the bunch-grass pastures have been uncovered sufficiently to allow placing of some bands of horses on grass. Most of the cattle and other stock are still being held at straw stacks and on feed yards. Reports from many of the farmers of the community state that feed supplies are holding out well and will in most cases be ample for feeding well into April if there is need for it.
Many of the farmers of this section are quite busy at this time with various kinds of repair work and daily feeding operations. Some wood cutting is still being done at some places. The most of the log hauling has been halted because of the bad conditions of the roads during the thawing part of the day. Not many of the logging contracts which were started here during the fall and early winter have been finished. In some instances work has been stopped a part of the time for various reasons. Some state they will be able to finish their contracts as soon as good weather and solid roads are realized.

Chats With Parents
LEARNING PROMPTNESS
Alice Judson Peale
A little child does not understand the meaning of time by the clock. It means nothing if mother says that something will happen in an hour, tomorrow or next week. But being told that he is to go to bed, time for bath, time to go to bed, time for stories, means a great deal. He can learn promptness in these terms.
Of course the most important factor in learning promptness is in the punctuality with which his schedule is observed by the adults who regulate his day.
Gradually he can be taught to cooperate in being on time to meet the daily events of eating, washing, dressing and going to bed.
He can learn that when mother says "Dinner time soon," he must put away his toys and be ready to come to table; that when mother comes into his room to close the window for the night, he must get up immediately to dress himself for breakfast.

Income Tax Facts
NO. 21
In determining the profit or loss from the sale of property acquired by gift, the basis depends upon the time the property was acquired. If the property was acquired by gift after December 31, 1920, the basis is the same as it would be in the hands of the donor or the last preceding owner by whom it was not acquired by gift. For example, a man in 1920 bought stock at \$100 a share and held it until January, 1929. He then gave the stock to his son, who in 1929, when it was worth \$150 a share, gave it to his wife. If in 1930 the wife sold the stock at \$120 a share, the difference between the cost of \$100 and the selling price of \$120, or \$20, would be taxable income to the wife. Had she sold it in 1930 at \$80 a share, the deductible loss would have been \$20 a share.
If, however, the property was acquired by gift on or before December 31, 1920, the basis for determining the profit or loss from the sale would be the fair market value of the property at the time of its acquisition. For example, during 1919 a daughter received from her father certain securities which he had purchased in 1918 for \$12,000. At the time the daughter received the stock in 1919 it had a fair market value of \$15,000. She sold it in 1930 for \$18,000, the taxable gain being \$3,000. Had she sold the stock at \$12,000, the deductible loss would have been \$3,000.
The fair market value of a property is defined as "that amount which a willing seller would accept and a willing buyer to purchase."

He can learn not to dawdle over his tasks and understand that doing things on time is doing his share to make things pleasant for everyone, including himself.

CHILEAN AIR LINE PLANS
NEW ROUTE ACROSS WATER
SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Statistics this line, running north and south from the national air line show that from the capital, carried 5,108 passengers and 3,388,065 kilos of mail in 1929, as compared to only 72 passengers and 724,600 kilos of mail in 1920.
Due to increases in schedule and addition of new branches, the number of "air voyages" increased from 1,459 in 1929 to 2,583 in 1930.
The national air line now runs over a land course, but there is a tentative plan to make it largely an over-water line, using amphibians. With both land and sea planes in use, the air line would be able to train military pilots for both naval and army service. The army and navy now have no air branches.
