Easter Nearing And Churches Are Preparing

Musical Programs Will be One Feature—Many Interesting Services Here on Sunday.

With the city observing the Lenten period at present, churches and church organizations are beginning to make preparations for Easter Sunday, which takes place on April 5 this year.

Cantatas will be a feature of that day in La Grande, besides special Easter music and general observance of the day.

A number of interesting services have been announced for tomorrow as follows:

First M. E. Church
Fourth street and Spring avenue
Each Sunday is bringing more people into the Sunday Church school at 9:45 o'clock, probably to realize what is happening in the adult department. Classes for all in the church are being held, and a cordial welcome is extended to all.

At the morning worship service the choir will sing "How Beautiful Are the Mountains" by Martin. The pastor will speak on the subject "Stories That Jesus Told."

The Epworth League devotionals meeting at 8:30 o'clock will be the climax of the monthly social hour. The whole group will meet at 4:30 o'clock for a good time and light refreshments under the direction of Elizabeth Heise. The devotionals meeting will be in charge of Evelyn Piper and Edna Brown.

The 7:30 evening service will be the concluding forum discussion of the series "The Religion of Man-kind." Having considered "Confucianism," "Buddhism" and "Mohammedanism," the topic for the evening will be "Christianity." Members are urged to bring their questions and comments.

Health Talks
BLOOD TRANSFUSION
The idea of transfusing blood from one human to another or even from animals to humans is a very old one, but historic proof is lacking for any instance of blood transfusion before 1665.

At that time Richard Lower transfused blood from one animal to another. Two years later Dr. Jean-Baptiste Deshayes of Montpellier, physician to Louis XVI transfused blood into a man.

He is said to have injected the blood of a calf or lamb into the veins of a young man dying from repeated blood-letting. The patient is said to have survived.

Dr. Deshayes' experiments provoked violent controversies, which ended when a prohibition against blood transfusion was issued by the Paris Faculty of Medicine.

It appears that other attempts at transfusion had disastrous results.

An unsubstantiated claim has been made that an even earlier attempt at blood transfusion was made in April, 1492, the story being that when Pope Innocent VIII was dying blood from three youths was injected into his veins.

Transfusion of blood from one human to another became a practical and safe procedure in 1901 when Dr. Karl Landsteiner discovered what are called the four blood groups.

Recognition of these blood groups, some of which are antagonistic to and others of which are tolerant of each other, made safe transfusion possible.

It has been shown that an attempt to mix certain two of these four groups of blood results in destruction of the blood cells.

Such groups, therefore, are antagonistic. The mixing of these two bloods in the living human being is liable to result disastrously.

Others of the groups, however, tolerate one another, and the injection of a quantity of a tolerated blood is frequently a life saving action.

LEARNING ORDERLINESS
The child's first lessons in orderliness come through the regular observance of his routine and through the orderly arrangement of his environment.

A nursery kept trim and tidy, with plenty of shelves and drawers and boxes to keep things in, with hooks for clothing within the child's reach, is essential to making him take orderliness for granted.

On the other hand, a nursery crowded with furniture and too many possessions is almost sure to train a child to become accustomed to confusion. Closets and bureau drawers should contain only such clothing as is in regular use. Toys which have been outgrown should be removed.

Children naturally like orderliness. They like seeing the same arrangements day after day and finding their possessions always in the same place.

Frequent changes in sleeping place, lack of a proper place in which to keep toys and changes generally in the child's physical environment disturb and distress him. Of course he may become used to these things in time, but in so doing he loses his natural interest in keeping things in order and in putting them where they belong.

In training for orderliness, mother are apt to make the mistake of expecting too much. A two or three-year-old may have taken great pleasure in getting all his blocks out of the box, but putting them all back again is too long and wearisome a task.

Children need help and reminding. It is better to do most of the chore for them than to allow them to acquire a distaste for the task because they had to carry it through after they were tired.
