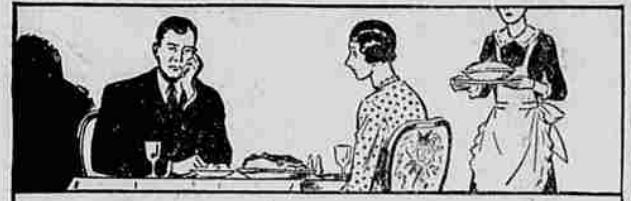
A.A.U.W. Literary Group Hears Vivid Accounts of Books

"The Marriage to India," a non-fiction work dealing with inter-marriage between a white girl, Frieda Hauswirth, and a Hindu man, which has caused a furor in literary circles since the time of publication, was reviewed by Mrs. John Miller and "R. V. R." by Van Loon, by Mrs. Walter Nichols, at a meeting of the contemporary literature group of the American Association of University Women last evening at the home of Miss Madeline Larson. Miss Hauswirth, who writes of her own experiences in India, is a Swiss woman, educated at Stanford University.

Hindu who was studying chemistry at the University of California. After her husband left California, she went to Hawaii from where they corresponded. The Hindu, in love with the Swiss girl, persuaded her that she could do more for India as the wife of a native son than she would be able to accomplish as an outsider.

Her husband was employed as chemist in sugar factories, and the economic conditions are such, Mrs. Miller states, that the factories run for only a short time, therefore the two were forced to wander about alone, while the Hindu was trying to obtain favor with the rajah of his province.

Miss Hauswirth believes that freedom in India will be gained from within. Constant strife is found between the plantations, which are owned by the Hindu, and the sugar factories, which are run by English-

men, and it is not until they are owned jointly by the same companies that strife will end.

A vivid picture of the hardships which she underwent on a sugar plantation in the interior are painted by the authoress. She was regarded as unapproachable by the relatives of her husband, and even among the servants, the caste system predominates, making life hard for the one who does not belong.

Most of the critics say, Mrs. Miller states, that although she writes very personally, her description of social conditions is authentic.

"R. V. R." by Van Loon, was reviewed by Mrs. Walter Nichols last evening when the literature group of the American Association of University Women met with Miss Madeline Larson at her home at the La Grande hotel. "R. V. R." deals with Rembrandt, the great painter of the Dutch school, whose art has lived because the artist was master of all that relates to coloring, distribution of light and shade, and composition.

Mrs. Nichols presented the review in an excellent and appreciative manner.

CURRY OF LAMB

Three cups chopped cooked lean lamb.
1 1/2 cup chopped celery and tops.
1 medium-sized onion, chopped.
3 tablespoons butter.
3/4 cup brown gravy or broth.
1/2 teaspoon curry.
3 dashes tabasco, salt.
Brown the celery and onion in but-

ter. Add the meat, gravy and seasoning. Stir until well mixed and hot. If too dry add 1/2 cup of boiling water. Serve the curried lamb with border of flaky boiled rice and garnish with parsley.
