HOOVER MAY RUN
WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—The prediction that President Hoover will run for re-election was made in the senate today by Senator Borah, in lauding the president's "courage" for vetoing the veterans loan bill.
The Connecticut Republican has been asked to run for a second term. "But I presume he will seek re-election," he said, "such is only the natural thing. There is nothing unusual about it."

fred Scott, as Gretel, sing the duet, "Oh Charming Castle," impressively. Natalie Samulson, as the mother, and Johnny Gruppe, as the father, interpret their lines in a manner that make the characters really live before the eyes of their audience. Mildred Green gives a clever portrayal of the wicked witch. She lends a group of six witches in a dance where broomsticks and mad rollicking gestures hold sway.
Though she plans to roast and eat Hansel and Gretel, they cleverly outwit her and when, finally, she herself is thrust into the oven, the children in the audience are thrilled at the unexpected turn in the events.
The artistic arrangement of the cottage in act I, the mysterious shadows of the woodland scene, the witch's alluring cookie house discovered in act III, and the various dances all contribute to give an atmosphere of fascination to the stage setting.
The costumes designed by the children and made by student teachers, assisted by the art department of the Normal school, are particularly interesting and original, adding another note of perfection to the performance which was lauded for its smoothness.

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VETS LOAN BILL PASSED OVER VETO

proposed to answer with a \$3,000,000, 000 or \$4,000,000,000 program," the Michigan senator said.
Long lines stood in the senate corridors seeking admission to the galleries as the senate convened an hour early.
The president's intimation of increased taxes, Vandenberg said, was "overcomplete."
"If there is tax increase next winter it will be because of this legislation," he said. "We are not creating a new debt, but merely transferring the form of a present obligation."
Senator Hastings, Republican, Delaware, replied to Vandenberg, as senators called for a vote.
He deprecated the paying of money to a veteran who returned from the war without any money, saying he would give all he had in material wealth if he had the record of some of the veterans.
Hastings suggested that some veterans would "steal the certificates" from their wives and go out and buy automobiles.
Replying to Hastings, Senator Cutting, Republican, New Mexico, said: "I feel sure the senator from Delaware did not talk that way in 1917 and 1919. That is, of course, an extreme statement of the case, which, however, runs to some extent through all the opposition to this bill—that is, that the veterans are not decent enough to pay any attention to their wives and families."
Cutting said the president's veto message contained several "misconceptions."
A group of applicants for veterans loans, estimated at from 15 to 20, today waited in the lobby of the veterans bureau for the senate to override President Hoover's veto.
Meanwhile, many veterans sought information by telephone.
Officials said they were prepared for a rush of applications if the senate overrides the veto. The house took such action yesterday.
After announcing the vote, Vice Republicans—Blaine, Brookhart, the senators having voted for the bill, the bill is passed notwithstanding the objection of the president.
