Storms Demoralize Shipping In Italy
NAPLES, Italy, Feb. 27 (P) — Twenty-seven deaths in Southern Italy were laid today to storms which demoralized shipping and did considerable damage inland during the last five days.
Loss of life was reported from such widespread points as Trapani, on the western tip of Sicily, and Messina and Foggia.
Flood waters today washed away houses in sections of Reggio and Calabria. Fallen buildings blocked the streets of Trapani, while the river Basento overflowed at Potenza, engulfing several buildings.
Two persons were killed in the collapse of a house at Santa Mirra. A church and a number of other buildings were wrecked at Amato. Twenty houses in the town of Cirro Marina. At St. Bruno the streets were flooded and bridges wrecked. Residents went about in boats.
Two persons were killed at Tursi where a factory collapsed.
The coasting steamer Maria Grazia was burning today 60 miles off Capri after rescue of 14 members of the crew by a Greek vessel. Several small boats were sunk by the heavy seas.

MAY APPOINT KORELL
ORTLAND, Feb. 27 (P) — Reports reaching here from Washington, D. C., lend credence to earlier rumors that Representative Franklin P. Korell of the third Oregon district, will be appointed an attorney in the income tax bureau of the treasury department.

Korell was defeated by General Charles H. Martin. The reports say Korell will be given the appointment on March 3, the day after his term as Representative expires, and he will not return to Oregon.
