Houses of Future May Be of Steel

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Some dwellings of the future may be built like modern skyscrapers, but without the ear-splitting clatter of riveting machines. Not only girders, but floors, walls, window frames and even balustrades may be fashioned from metal—cut to order but not standardized, so any type of architecture may be carried out.

Designs for such houses of welded steel have been patented by the Sullivan Steel Company here.

Exterior facing and interior decoration may be of any style, as in homes built by present methods.

Erection of the steel houses, in which portable welding apparatus would fuse the various parts, should take only half the time required to build an ordinary house, plant officials say.

Such structures would be sound-proof, fire-proof, vermin-proof and insulated against heat and cold, while over a period of years, it is claimed, they would prove less expensive than existing types of houses, due to smaller fire and tornado hazards.

Charles Thomas, Of Medford, Is New Dept. Head

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 3 (AP)—Charles M. Thomas, of Medford, was Saturday appointed by Governor Meier to the office of commissioner of utilities of the state of Oregon.

This office, with Thomas at its head, supplants the public service commission of three members which was abolished by the legislature.

Thomas is a former circuit judge of Jackson and Josephine counties, and was defeated in 1928 by H. D. Norton, a Democrat, of Grants Pass. He has practiced law in Medford since.

Thomas was interested in irrigation as an organizer of irrigation districts.

He was born in Iowa in 1877, was graduated from the University of Iowa in 1897, and entered the practice of law in 1898. He located in Medford in 1912.

He served in the lower house of the Oregon legislature in 1914 and 1916, and was elected to the senate for one term in 1918.

While in the senate Thomas was closely allied with the late Senator George W. Joseph.

He was for a time state chairman of the Republican central committee.

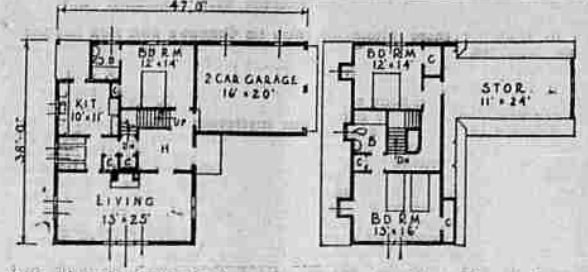
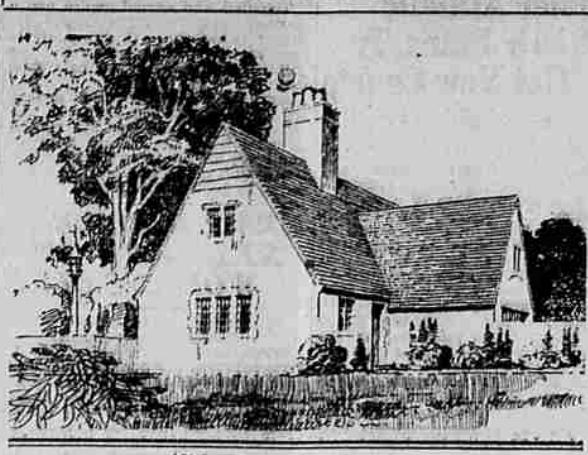

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LINKS CHARM TO ECONOMY



This six-room house with garage attached is designed in the manner of the homes of Normandy and Brittany, being also closely akin in spirit to some of the English cottages.

Low eaves and many gables give a charming touch, suggestive of these other lands and the interesting groups built up in their rural sections.

The walls are of stone, which may be backed up with a cheaper material such as concrete block or hollow tile. The surface of this stone perhaps will be rough-hewn, or a smoother-faced limestone in a variety of sizes offers possibilities.

These stones should be laid so that they touch one another with the joints scarcely showing. The roof is of slate or shingle tile, and an important note is struck by the large chimney with the terra cotta pots.

Grange in color. The windows are metal casements.

Many attempts at building this type of house in America have failed to achieve a beauty found attractive in England for the reason that the owner does not provide the charm to enclose the garden or service yard.

Such things as this, together with the cheerful flower garden located in the rear, are vital to the effect sought.

The garage is conveniently located and entered from the hall.

Since stone walls are not so expensive when the eaves are kept low, the estimated cost of this house, \$8,000 to \$10,000, is affected accordingly.

The exact cost will be governed, apart from this, by local factors and the owner's choice of materials.

A lot 90 by 100 feet, larger if possible, is recommended.
