4 teaspoon paprika 1/2 teaspoon celery salt 1/2 cup flour 4 tablespoons fat 4 tablespoons butter 1 1/2 cups water 1/2 cup milk

Thoroughly wash and clean chicken and cut into serving pieces. Sprinkle with salt, paprika and celery salt. Dip into flour. Heat fat in frying pan. Add and brown chicken. Remove to baking pan and dot with butter. Add 1/2 the water. Cover and bake one hour in moderately slow oven. Inspect frequently and turn to allow even browning. Add rest of water and cook 1/2 hour or until the chicken is very tender. Add milk. Mix well and arrange chicken on serving platter and cover with gravy which has formed in pan during cooking. Garnish with parsley.

2 pounds broccoli 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon paprika 1/2 tablespoons butter 4 tablespoons lemon juice

Thoroughly look over broccoli and remove wilted leaves and coarse part of stalks. Cover with cold water and add 1/2 teaspoon of salt. Soak 15 minutes. Drain well and cover by 3 inches with more cold water, and add one teaspoon of salt given in recipe. Boil gently 30 minutes. Drain well. Arrange in serving dish and cover with rest of ingredients. Serve at once.

Filling for Orange Tarts 1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons flour 2 eggs 1/2 cup orange juice 3 tablespoons lemon juice 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup water 1/2 tablespoons butter

Blend sugar and flour. Add all rest of ingredients. Cook until thick and creamy in double boiler. Stir frequently. Pour into baker tart shells and fill. Serve plain or top with whipped cream.

Whatever investigations are made by the new commission of utilities into valuations and rates of utility corporations will have to be made with an added \$9900 that was allowed by the committee, although previously a request of \$50,000 had been made.

The committee increased the \$18,947 previously allowed the department to \$27,947, the amount requested in the budget.

Senator C. B. Bernhard, of Union county, said that as a member of the committee in 1921 had predicted that the public service commission would come into disuse if the committee insisted on limiting its funds for investigations. "That is just what has happened," he added.
