Joint Observance Of Holy Week Is Protestant Plan

Bishop Remington to Visit St. Peter's Church— Baptists to Observe Family Day.

Churches throughout the city are preparing for Easter, the festival kept in commemoration of the Saviour's resurrection. Special music is being prepared by all the churches, and while the Catholic, Episcopal, and Lutheran churches are keeping a strict observance of the Lenten season, which lasts until Easter, April 6, the other Protestant churches are planning for a joint observance of Holy Week, the week preceding Easter.

The ministerial association will meet Saturday morning at 10 o'clock to complete plans for the religious ceremonies which will be kept by Protestants throughout the city.

St. Peter's Church

Fourth street at O avenue

Bishop William P. Remington, bishop of the Eastern Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church, will deliver the Sunday evening sermon at St. Peter's church with services beginning at 7:30. Mrs. H. N. Ashby will play the service and the choir will sing.

Morning prayer is held at 11 o'clock with the rector speaking on "The

Christian and Faith." Mrs. Ashby will play the service.

Other services of the day are Holy Eucharist at 8 a. m., Sunday school at 9:45, with a junior church service for the church school and an illustrated lecture.

Oregon Blue Books Will Cost 25c Each

SALEM, Mar. 5 (AP)—The Oregon Blue Book, which, since its publication began when Ben W. Olcott was secretary of state, has been distributed free to all who wanted it, will be paid for by the general public at 25 cents a volume by a ways and means committee bill passed yesterday.

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Also the appropriation is increased from \$4000 to \$5000 so the book may be published in more attractive form. School children, state county and city officials will continue to receive the book free.

Wind and High Tide

Attack East Coast

BOSTON, Mar. 5 (AP)—The highest tide in 22 years, aggravated by a strong northeast wind, yesterday invaded the New England coast, inundated streets, stalled automobiles and marooned occupants of waterfront buildings. Transportation service, both steam and motor, was at a standstill in many sections and because approaches were under water,

ferry service in Boston harbor was suspended. Property damage was expected to reach a high figure.

Tow boats were employed along Boston's water front, when docks and streets disappeared beneath the sea. Hundreds of automobiles were stalled

throughout the coastal region, and the main highway from Lynn to Boston was impassable.

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
