TRAINING SCHOOL FACILITIES

The urgent need of training school facilities in connection with the Eastern Oregon Normal School is indicated in the appropriation voted by the legislature of \$50,000.00 for that purpose. The measure requires only the governor's signature to make it effective.

In recognition of its necessity, recommendation for this appropriation was the sole item of capital outlay included in the budget of the State Board of Higher Education. The sub-committee of the ways and means committee came to La Grande, made a careful study of the situation and unanimously approved this item. After a thorough consideration of all facts the bill providing for the needed facilities was approved by both legislative bodies.

The citizens of Eastern Oregon are gratified at the prospect that the work of this, the only institution of higher learning in Oregon situated east of the Cascade mountains, is not to be further hampered in its work by lack of essential facilities.

The people of La Grande will welcome the opportunity to join with the state in the solution of a problem of common interest, assuming their full responsibility both toward the state and the education of their own children.

Most of all—will training school children, normal school students and instructors, who for two years have with cheerful good-will worked in crowded quarters and under unsatisfactory conditions, rejoice in the relief that will be provided, and in the opportunity to further pursue their tasks with the aid of adequate facilities.

The Eastern Oregon Normal school was established primarily for the purpose of training teachers for the elementary schools. The effective training of teachers requires a properly appointed and adequately equipped practice school. With this essential equipment, the value of the service rendered by this institution will be felt in every elementary school room and community of Eastern Oregon.

AGRICULTURE'S COMING LEADERSHIP.

My faith in the future of American agriculture is greater today than it ever has been. Times may be a bit hard, prices lower than they ought to be and conditions throughout industry unsatisfactory for the moment, but there is a great corrective force at work in agriculture and its effect will be increasingly evident from year to year.

The hope of agriculture, the force that will find the solutions for its many perplexing problems, the leadership that will blaze the trail to farm prosperity, is in the younger generation of farm boys and girls. On them rests a tremendous responsibility, a challenging opportunity for service. And they are eager to accept it. In fact they have accepted it and are at work, with an enthusiasm that can't be downed, and an optimism and courage that will not countenance defeat.

During the last summer I have had repeated contacts with these farm boys and girls, men and women of tomorrow. I have seen them at 4-H club meetings, at state fairs, at

county and local fairs, at farm picnics, in conventions and at work on the farms. I have talked with them, and have heard them discuss the problems of agriculture, both of an economic and practical nature. I have seen the results of their thoughtful labor and I have sensed their desires and their ambitions. The more I saw of their accomplishments, the more fully I realized the force for good that they represent. These boys and girls are dynamic. They are not satisfied with things as they are. They have the determination to effect the changes which will establish things as they ought to be. They are not the compromising kind. They want nothing less than equality with other industry, a standard of living equal to that of other classes of our population, a future that is limited only by their ability to serve.

Next Big Blimp Will Be Housed On West Coast

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sunnyvale, 1900 acres of flat farm land in a natural bowl below San Francisco bay, is to be transformed into a \$5,000,000 home for a projected super-dirigible, the ZRS-5.

The site, 33 miles southeast of San Francisco by air line, was donated to the government by the San Francisco and associated chambers of commerce and will be developed as a west coast naval airship base.

By December, 1932, the navy plans, the wide acres of alfalfa land and seed farms will be converted into a lighter-than-air base in time to receive the 6,800,000 cubic foot sister-ship of the ZRS-4, or Akron, now under construction.

Hangar to Cost \$2,500,000
The Akron, scheduled to be completed in the summer, will be housed at Lakehurst, N. J., where the hangar is large enough also to accommodate the Los Angeles, the navy's German-made rigid air liner.

First on the contemplated program for developing Sunnyvale will be erection of a hangar, estimated to cost \$2,500,000, for which the navy hopes to let a contract in June.

It will be 1,172 feet long, 308 feet wide, and 194 feet in height, large enough to accommodate a dirigible of 10,000,000 cubic feet size.

A mooring mast, towering 90 feet, will be erected while a perfected mobile mast, similar to the one developed at Lakehurst to tow ships into the hangar with less man power, may be provided.

Near San Francisco Bay
The hangar will be started first, because it will take longest to build. Other work will be undertaken later, including construction of shops, power and water plants, facilities for handling helium, the lifting gas, quarters for personnel, administration and recreation buildings, and an aerological station.

Sunnyvale borders on the tidelands of San Francisco bay in a valley between the low Santa Cruz mountains which parallel the west coast and the Mount Hamilton range.

It is 20 miles from the Pacific ocean and has an average elevation of 15 feet above sea level. For flight operations, studies have shown that there are about 220 days clear, 75 partly cloudy, 70 cloudy, and about 60 rainy.

The average wind speed in 5.66 miles an hour. The wind direction is nearly constant, being north-northwest for nine months and southeast for the remainder of the year.

Demand for Copper Sends Price Higher

NEW YORK, Mar. 5 (AP)—A sharp increase in domestic demand for copper, despite the advance of a quarter of a cent to 10 1/2 cents a pound the first of the week, was reported yesterday in trade circles.

Estimates placed the amount of the metal sold during the previous 24 hours at 12,000,000, of which 10,000,000 pounds was sold to have been sold to domestic consumers. Among the larger purchasers were the Pennsylvania railroad and one of the large telephone companies.

The American Brass Co. has advanced 1/4 of a cent a pound in copper products and 1/4 of a cent on brass products.

Instructions Given Bridge Killer Jury

KANSAS CITY, Mar. 6 (AP)—Prosecution attorneys in conference with Judge Ralph L. Latashaw yesterday said he had ruled tentatively against a first degree murder instruction to the jury in the trial of Mrs. Myrtle A. Bennett, accused bridge game slayer.

Under this ruling possible verdicts would be second degree murder, manslaughter, acquittal or acquittal through verdicts of justifiable or excusable homicide.

Arguments over the contents of the jury instructions began with the opening of court yesterday and continued until the noon recess. Defense counsel offered seventy suggested instructions.
